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
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

Paton here on Tuesday afternoon, April 13th, when her aged and beoved mother, Mrs. McMillan, passed to her reward soon after being seized with a slight stroke. Though not in her usual health for a short time, death was not anticipated so soon, for. the very bright old lady was well preserved with her faculties unimpaired. Her sudden call was a shock to her family, but full of faith and plessed assurance, her peaceful passing was comforting to all and was a fitting close to her long beautiful Christian life. The deceased, whose malden name was Ann Smith, was born on the island of Islay, Scotland, in 1838 and was therefore in her 85th year. At 18 years of age she came with her parents to Canada. and after living about four years in Erin Township settled among the pioneers in Proton, where on March 17th, 1863, she was married to the late Mr. Duncan McMillan, a well known resident in the township, who died 19 years ago. Mr. and Mrs. McMillan took a deep interest in all religious work and were very highly respected in the Swinton Park comnunity where they lived so long. The latter left the homestead seven years ago to reside with her daugher here. She was a lifelong and deyout Presbyterian specially well versed in the Scriptures. Her Bible, which she loved to read in Gaelic, was her daily companion and source of comfort and strength. The funeral took place to Swinton Park Cemetery


