Crop Competition

Standing Field Crop Competition as conducted by the Markdale Agricultural Society. Crop selections are "White Oats" of which there must be not less than five acres. "Corn" of which there must be not less than five acres. If a field contains more than the registered acreage for competition it will be necessary for the competitor to cut a swath in the field of corn between the part to be judged and the balance of the field or set a row of stakes not less than four feet high for a division line.

Competition will be limited to those who are paid up members of the Agricultural Society and the fields entered shall not be more than fifteen miles from its headquarters. There must be not less than ten entries for each competition, and such entries must be forwarded to the Secretary of the Agricultural Society on or before May 19th.

Prize winners in the competition for oats will be required to exhibit at the Fall Fair one bushel of the oats and a sheaf not less than eight (8) inches in diameter at the binding, for which liberal cash prizes will be offered.

The following cash prizes are offered for each crop: 1st, \$20.00; 2nd, \$15.00; 3rd, \$12.00; 4th, \$10.00; 5th, \$8.00; 6th, \$6.00; 7th, \$4.00. In order to furnish the best varieties of grain and corn it has been decided that competitors should select from the following varieties: Oats—O.A.C. 72; Banner; Abundance; Canary Filler; Mammoth Cluster and Yellow Russian. Corn—Early maturing varieties. The judges are supplied by the Ontario Department of Agriculture.
