The May meeting of the local Farmers' Club, which was held on Monday evening, of this week, was largely attended and very beneficial and interesting to those present. Mr. Tisdale, of the Co-Operative Wool Growers' Association, of Weston, and Mr. T. S. Cooper, Agricultural Representative, of Markdale, were present and delivered addresses. Mr. Tisdale is a splendid and pleasing speaker, who knows what he's talking about, and covered, frankly and fully, every detail in connection with the co-operative marketing of wool, and told of the growth of the Association from handling only a few thousand pounds of wool in 1917, up to four million pounds in 1921. He explained how wool was graded; what constituted the selling charges; gave the different wool markets of the world, and told how the American market was closed to the Canadian producer by the Fordney Tariff, and of the efforts of the Association to break down the prejudice of Canadian manufacturers to Canadian wool. He predicted a bright future for the co-operative marketing of all farm produce, if the farmers would only stick together. He paid a tribute to Mr. Cooper, saying that he was doing more real, downright, hard work for the benefit of the farmers than any representative he had ever met. Mr. Cooper spoke briefly, telling of his work with lambs, and the inoculating of alfalfa seed, etc. A splendid letter from Miss McPhail, M.P., was another pleasing feature of the meeting, and her reference to the McMaster and Irwin resolutions brought out considerable discussion.
