Eugenia Reserve  
Gets 150,000 Fish

EUGENIA FALLS, May 15.—More than 300,000 young fish will be planted in the waters of Ontario this season from the hatcheries of the Department of Game and Fisheries. The interesting ceremony of planting 150,000 young speckled trout in the waters of the Province's own fishery and game reserve at Eugenia Falls on Saturday was but one more example of this quiet, accumulative work being done in the Province. In the presence of several visitors Hon. S. Myles, Minister of Mines and Forests, D. McDonald, Deputy Minister of Game and Fisheries; Geo. M. Leeson, the Provincial Member for South Grey, and A. W. McLeod, supervisor of hatcheries, poured the first cans of fish into the waters of the reserve. Altogether 50 cans containing the young trout were brought to Fiesher-ton on Saturday morning from the hatcheries at Sault Ste. Marie. A special express car for the purpose was provided free of charge by the government by the Can. Pacific Ry. From Fiesher-ton the cans were taken by motor truck to the Eugenia Reserve eight miles away.

"Spread out in the water of the stream, these minute little creatures flicked as silver specks for a minute and disappeared. "In one year," said Deputy Minister McDonald, "these fish will be from three to four inches in length. In three years, seven inches long, they begin to spawn."

### Reforestation in Egremont

DR JAMIESON HAS PURCHASED 250 ACRES AND WILL PLANT OUT THOUSANDS OF TREES.

There has been a lot said of reforestation in Grey County, but practically nothing has been done by public bodies. It remained for Dr. Jamieson, Ex-M.P.P., of Durham to take a practical interest in the matter. The Durham Review says: We are delighted to learn that Dr. Jamieson has purchased about 250 acres in North Egremont in and near where the McLean saw mill used to operate. He intends to have it fenced to allow nature to have her way with the growth at present existing, but purposes to plant out under expert advice some thousands of butternut and other trees of commercial value. There are streams running through it, while the doctor has no hope of equaling Jack Miner, he believes a kind of sanctuary of wild life will result from the experiment. He intends also to deposit trout spawn in the streams.

We shall watch with keenest interest this development. It has not only aesthetic interest, but will have a commercial value by and by, even though the promoter may not live to see it. It will, however, we are sure, be one of the pleasures of his later years to watch its development.

Reforestation is one of the great needs of Ontario at this day. Not only for the conservation of moisture in the soil but actually for the annual market value of the timber that will be produced. Sweden and other European countries are reforesting realizing already from reforested areas. Too many Canadians of the last generation looked on a tree as an enemy to be got rid of. That day is past and one may hope that for two or three weeks now wherever there is a chance "to stick in a tree" it will be done.
