### Preserve War Trophies

Newspapers in neighboring towns are calling attention to the neglected state of the war trophies entrusted to the care of the municipal authorities by the Militia Department. In Orillia this complaint does not apply but when he was here last fall Dr. Currelly, curator of the Royal Ontario Museum, called attention to another danger. Guns made of steel will not stand constant exposure to the weather, and Dr. Currelly declared that unless more care is taken there will be none of these trophies left in twenty-five years. Either they should be kept under cover, or if this is not practicable, they should be regularly painted so as to keep the steel from rusting. It should be somebody's duty to see that these guns are preserved as reminders of sacrifices made by the young men of this generation in the cause of freedom.—Orillia Packet.
