A Tragic Ending

The tragic death of Miss Dora K. Hall happened on Monday morning, May 29th, at her home at Invermay, when in a fit of despondency she took her own life, passing away in a few minutes. Deceased had been in poor health for some time, suffering from mental and nervous illness, and arrangements were being completed to have her removed to a hospital. Her sisters were giving her every attention and care, but during the interval of only a few moments while alone in her room, the deceased committed the deed. A coroner was summoned but it was decided an inquest was unnecessary. Miss Hall, who was born at Invermay, and a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Hall, had many friends who sincerely regret her sudden and tragic demise. She is survived by five sisters and three brothers. They are—Miss E. Hall, at home; Mrs. Powley, in the West; Mrs. Harvey, and Mrs. Bradey, of Markdale, and Miss Esther Hall, of Winnipeg; Mr. Isaac Hall, of Parry Sound; Mr. John Hall, Vancouver. The funeral was held yesterday afternoon, (May 31), to Tara cemetery, the services being in charge of Rev. Mr. Farr, of Christ Church, of which the deceased was a member. The brothers and all sisters have the sincere sympathy of the community in their bereavement.—Tara Leader.

low from the brothers and sisters, sheet from Cherry Grove Women's Institute; wreath from Mrs. W. C. Fraser, of Owen Sound; spray from Miss Vera Myers, of Markdale; also flowers from Invermay friends.

Owen Sound Presbytery

An unusually well attended meeting of the Presbytery of Owen Sound was held at Watton last week. Considerable business was transacted and a most enjoyable day spent. The call to Rev. J. Thurburn-Conn, of Markdale, to Chateaugay, Quebec, was approved and the Presbytery went on record with the following resolution—That the Owen Sound Presbytery accord hearty approval of the public services of Rev. J. Thurburn-Conn during his five years work in the Presbytery, and trust that he will have an opportunity for greater work in his new charge.

Markdale Congregation

The following from the congregation here is also a tribute to the Reverend gentleman's popularity and ability:
Markdale, Ont., May 28th, 1922.
A meeting of the congregation of Cooke's Church, was held immediately following the morning service. Mr. S. A. Morrison was appointed chairman and explained that the meeting was called for a two-fold object.

1st. To discuss and determine the attitude of the congregation towards the call extended to Rev. Mr. Conn by the congregation of Chateaugay, Quebec.

2nd. To appoint a delegate to attend the meeting of Presbytery in this connection at Watton on Tuesday, May 30th.

It was moved by Mr. R. L. Stephen, and seconded by Mr. T. H. Wilson that the following resolution be presented to Presbytery:
"That this meeting desires to place on record its appreciation of our Pastor, Rev. J. Thurburn-Conn, who has so ably, faithfully and earnestly ministered to this congregation for upwards of five years.
That our people and the citizens of Markdale regret sincerely the occasion which is responsible for the loss of a minister who has endeared himself to the congregation, and has been one of the acknowledged leaders of every movement for the up-lift of the community.
That having these things in remembrance, we are also able to real-

Owen Sound North

An application from the Union congregation, of Owen Sound North, for an extension of one year of the time Rev. Stanley Elliott will occupy the pulpit of the United Church, was favorably received, and the Presbytery recommended that the congregation extend the term there from two to three years. This has the approval of the Home Mission Boards of both churches.

Daywood Church

With reference to the proposed sale of Daywood Church, which has not been in use for some time, the Presbytery decided that the congregation has the power to sell, subject to the approval of the Presbytery. Until the church is sold, the control of the use of the building is in the hands of the session of the congregation.

Rev. J. L. Melnis was appointed to the Committee on Sunday School and Young People's Work, made vacant by the translation of Rev. J. Thurburn-Conn.
