General Assembly

Rev. John Lennox, minister at Temple Hill and Knox, Holland, has arrived home in safety after his long journey to Winnipeg, where the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church conducted its annual business. Some of the important business dealt with was Church Union, for the time being, is held up so as to give the Committee time to investigate the legal technicalities in regard to Church property.

Mr. Lennox moved an amendment to this procedure, which was seconded by Dr. Nelson, of Hamilton. The reasons Mr. Lennox gave for his amendment were as follows: "That the General Superintendents of the Home Missions had stated to the Assembly that co-operation was working harmoniously and they led the Assembly to believe that Church Union already existed in these new territories." "If this be so," continued Mr. Lennox, "then why not continue co-operation for five years more in the older settled provinces." In the face of such a strong minority, and the legal enactments as to Church property, Mr. Lennox emphatically declared "that to take up the legal question in the near future was only going to put Union further off, and that it was not necessary to have organic union in order to get Union; that there is such a thing as getting Union, in time, by co-operation." At the end of five years," Mr. Lennox said, "many will have passed off the scene who are the leaders in this movement and there would arise a new generation who knew not Joshua or the Elders of Israel."
