At Flesherton on Thursday last the local ball team were defeated by the home team by a 12 to 13 score. Markdale went to bat first and in the first two innings failed to score. In each of the third, fourth and fifth one run was secured. Two were secured in the sixth as well as the seventh. The eighth added one and the ninth four. Flesherton scored one, two and three in the first three innings. The fourth, fifth and sixth were scoreless, but in the seventh they got four. In their eighth they got one and in the ninth two. This was enough to win the game and play ceased with but one out.

"Murphy" Mercer pitched the first three innings when he was replaced by Bowler, whose place behind the bat was taken by C. Mercer.

Markdale players were: Bowler, Beard, Dundas, H. Mercer, C. Mercer, Beaton, Sims, Tuck and Murdoch.

The local management have protested the game on the grounds that Howard is ineligible to play with Flesherton and that the decisions of the umpire were unfair and resulted in the defeat of the Markdale team. The protests will be supported with affidavits. Personally, we do not like winning ball games by the protest route but in this case we believe the game should at least be ordered played over again with a competent official in charge. We saw but one of the disputed decisions from close range and it certainly was one of the rarest we have ever seen. Many of the Flesherton team supporters were disgusted with the decisions given.

At Vandeleur, on the same day, Dundalk won by 19 to 10 and thus The Standard's guess last week on the winning teams in both cases, proved wrong. The same umpire officiated and he certainly handed some awful decisions to the Dundalk bunch.
