Period Furniture
Lesson No. 3
CHIPPENDALE
(1730-1775)

This name is commonly given to a good deal of early eighteenth century furniture that was not Chippendale's. For when he began to design Gothic and Chinese styles were already in vogue; his achievement was the harmonious blending of these and French and Dutch styles into a real Chippendale type. He was a great but hardly an original genius; as his book of designs shows (The Gentleman and Cabinet Maker's Directory, 1754) he was primarily a carver, though he took great pains always with proportion, construction and joinery. Chippendale pieces are chiefly in Mahogany, sometimes in Walnut, and he seems to have liked softwood, japanned in color, with gilt ornaments. He never used inlay or painting, but some of his finest pieces are japanned or gilded. For ornament he used scrolls, shellwork, cupids, bell-flowers, fruits, leaves and animals. His chairs show a great variety of legs—straight and square, cabriole, modified claw-and-ball or elaborately carved in fantastic designs. He is fond of the "ogee" curve, the fluttering ribbon, and other marks of the current French style. He designed every kind of household furniture, much of which has come down to the present day.

The special designs known as Chinese "Chippendale" constitute a distinct type whose charm and elegance contribute largely to his fame.

Death of Mrs. E. Rutledge

(Fort William Journal of July 26)
Mrs. Rutledge, sr., who has been at death's door for the past few days, passed away at five o'clock this morning. She was in her eighty-second year. Her husband, the late Edward Rutledge, died eleven years ago.

Mrs. Rutledge came here in 1907 from Markdale to spend her latter days with her family. She had her own home at 220 North Syndicate where she died, her three daughters, Mrs. Sarah M. Armstrong, Mrs. Millie Reynolds and Mrs. Helena M. Pratt being with her when she passed away. She was born in Leeds county, Ontario and lived most of her life in Grey county, where the members of the family were born. She was a life-long member of the Methodist church, in which religious body her husband was class leader for forty years.

She is survived by nine children, Edward S., Fort William; Albert E., Monrovia, Cal.; Thomas W., Vancouver, B.C.; John W., Los Angeles, Cal.; J. Edgar, Fort William; Mrs. Martha M. McNabb, Calgary; Mrs. Sarah M. Armstrong, Peterboro; Mrs. Millie Reynolds, at home; Mrs. Helena M. Pratt, Medicine Hat.

During the early part of Mrs. Rutledge's illness her son Albert E., and her daughter Mrs. McNabb were here, but when she rallied they returned home again. All the members of the family were present when she died.

Her husband, Edward S. Rutledge, brought up her large family with the exception of one, a little boy three years old, who died forty-nine years ago.

A veritable mother in Israel was Mrs. Rutledge. Her every thought was centered in her family, and her long and useful life had had its reward in the comforts of her family.

A large concourse of people attended the obsequies of Mrs. E. Rutledge, sr., the funeral being held to Wesley Methodist Church. The many who congregated at the Church testified to the esteem in which the deceased was held in the hearts and affection of those who had learned to admire her many sterling qualities and hold in high regard the members of her family, all of whom have grown up in this city and no are well and widely known.

H. G. Closs, organist and choirmaster, was playing soft music on the organ when the cortege arrived at the Church. Here the service was conducted by Rev. G. S. Cleidmen, pastor, and two favorite hymns were sung, "Jesus, Lover of My Soul," and "Son of My Soul."

The Church was redolent with the sweet perfume of the great masses of flowers which surrounded the casket. Old friends of the family acted as pallbearers, E. K. Andrews, B. B. Clements, James Hall, J. B. Evans, H. M. Bher and R. Thibadeau.

Chief mourners at the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. Edward Rutledge, Mr. and Mrs. J. Edgar Rutledge, Mrs. Helena M. Pratt, Medicine Hat; Mrs. Millie Reynolds; Fort William; and Mrs. Armstrong, Peterboro, the last three being daughters. Messengers have been received from the sons and daughters in California and Vancouver, stating that they have received advice of their mother's death.

Many autos followed the remains to their last resting place in Mountain View cemetery. Mrs. Rutledge leaves behind her a fragrant memory of well-spent years, of duty well done and the example of a pious life and Christian motherhood.
