Period Furniture

Lesson No. 4
SHERATON

General Character: Chaste and reserved design, featured by straight lines and flat surfaces, delicately colored or decorated with inlays.

Sheraton is called the "chaste designer"; his was the talent for assembling even severe lines into furniture of exquisite grace. He depended upon scientific, geometrical construction, insisting that condition were realized the result could be independent of passing fashion. He perpetuated much of the grace and refinement Heppelwhite introduced in more substantial forms. Sheraton's chairs were his most striking articles. The backs were structural, i. e. visibly self-supporting. The seat lines were straight and points of juncture accentuated rather than depressed. The square backed chair belonged to Sheraton and while the fillers varied, horizontal bars joined by vertical bars predominated. Curves, where employed, were graceful and usually framed with vertical lines, cuts were square-cornered and while curves were frequent in the arms, they were sweeping and not abrupt. While Heppelwhite characteristically pulled his seat cover well over the apron, Sheraton preferred to show the seat frame to give visible support to his cushioning. Sheraton legs are slender, round or square, and tapered. They are clearly marked at the point of support and instead of being left to warp, after the Heppelwhite manner, are often stiffened by volutes. The principal form of enrichment was by inlays of different woods.

BASEBALL

The Vandeleur team defeated the Ceylon boys at the former place on Thursday last by a 9 to 2 score. A. Buchanan pitched for the winners and had the visitors at his mercy most of the time. Russell Graham, behind the bat, was also in good form and the support in the field was good. A feature of the game was the heavy hitting of the Vans. Dave Graham put one out of the grounds altogether and secured a homer on it. By this win Vandeleur still remains in the running for the championship.

There are no league games this week but Dundalk comes to Markdale on Thursday of next week.

On Tuesday evening the League Executive Committee met at Flesherston for the transaction of general business. One of the chief items was the hearing of the protest of the game won by Flesherston from Markdale on July 29th. By mutual consent between the clubs the protest was dropped and the game will be replayed in Flesherston on a date to be chosen by the Flesherston club. The standing of Howard, whose right to play with Flesherston was questioned, was also settled by an amendment to the League constitution and in future it cannot be questioned. In settling the dispute the Flesherston representatives proved to be real sportsmen and deserve the commendation of all supporters of the game.

The Sounders were held scoreless extending in the eighth when they got two, making their total four. H. Mercer was in the box for the locals and pitched a faultless game. H. Bowler was in good form behind the bat and the fielders gave excellent support. If Markdale can repeat their performance in the games against Vandeleur, Flesherston and Dundalk there is no doubt as to the result of the Centre Grey League championship.

At Rocklyn on Monday the Vandeleur bunch covered themselves all over with glory when they won the tournament. In the first game Clarksburg were defeated by the Vans, the score being 1 to 0. Thornbury then defeated Meaford by four to three and in the final game Vandeleur beat Thornbury by 10 to 1. Goldsmith, Clarksburg's noted pitcher, was well supported by Catcher Loughheed and the other players but they couldn't beat the heavy hitters from Vandeleur. In the Thornbury game the Clarksburg battery undertook to out play the Vans but Goldsmith was relieved by Ellis after seven runs had been secured in one inning. Ab. Buchanan and D. Graham pitched for the winners and Rus. Graham caught.

Markdale Football Team Wins Silver Cup.

In their defeating the fast traveling Holstein team by a 2-0 score at Durham on Monday (Civic holiday) the local eleven captured the handsome silver cup donated by the Hospital Committee of that town. The game was played on a heavy field and during a drizzling rain but despite these conditions the play was fast and most strenuous as both teams checked heavy and waged an interesting contest from start to finish.

Holstein won the toss and chose to kick with the breeze which was sure to their advantage as they pressed the local citadel for several minutes but King and Bradley at full back were real stumbling blocks to the entrance. However conditions were beginning to change and the locals were occasionally taking a dangerous offensive. After working the ball well up the right wing Stewart shot a hard one which the goalie got but Pullam caught, the rebound and drove in one of the non-stop variety. Within a few minutes another shot rained in from the left wing which the goalie also saved but only for Geo. Seabrook to score on the rebound.

Holstein started out in the second half hour with a marked determination to score but the local half back continuously broke up the combination and in turn supported their own forwards well whose short, quick passing kept the opposing defence well occupied but the game ended without further scoring. Holstein are a fast well trained team and were strong contenders for distinction in the W.F.A., having won seven consecutive League games leaving three and losing only one.
