SHERATON 1790—1806

This most popular of all great English designs, began his work as a chippendale and Adam were finishing theirs and although too great to be a mere imitator, he credited to the latter much of his inspiration. His model was imagination, combined with perfect proportion, and he had his conception of the furniture of that longer used just to be a rather severe form. His style of harmony directed the use of the chair form, fluted legs with curved backs and his tables and sideboards were his favorites, painting with a satin wood supplying his wonderful color effects. His sideboards and high, on lovely tapered legs, with very often a back composed of two or three slender brass rails, sometimes quite ornamental. They are long, with curving fronts, and are decorated with initial lines and medallions.

Sheraton is essentially a dreamer whose dreams outstripped his resources, and his furniture is among our choicest heritage from the eighteenth century.

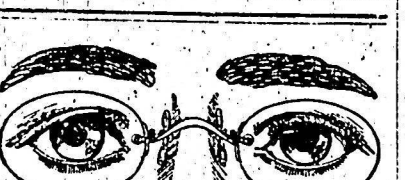

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Priest Shot in Proton

On Saturday evening, Rev. T. J. Clochey, of Dundalk, was shot in the breast, just as he was about to leave St. Patrick's Church, Proton, where he had been preparing for the early morning service on Sunday. The shooting was done by John Cosgrove, Jr., a son of John Cosgrove, who resides within a few miles of the church. It appears that Cosgrove, Sr., had intended giving the son, who is a deaf mute, a farm a few months ago, but on the advice of Father Clochey the transaction was not completed. Trouble followed and steps were then taken to have the young man placed in the care of some institution but for some reason this was not done. It is supposed that the shooting was the result of this trouble.

Father Clochey had just stepped from the church when the shot was fired and no one saw Cosgrove excepting the wounded priest, who was able to make his way to a neighbor's, where medical aid was summoned. It is hoped that his recovery will be speedy and unless some unforeseen complications arise, no serious results are anticipated.

It is a regrettable affair and demonstrates again that it is not safe to give too much liberty to those whose minds are not at all times rational. Cosgrove made his escape and remained in hiding until Monday morning when he returned home for food. He was then taken to Owen Sound.

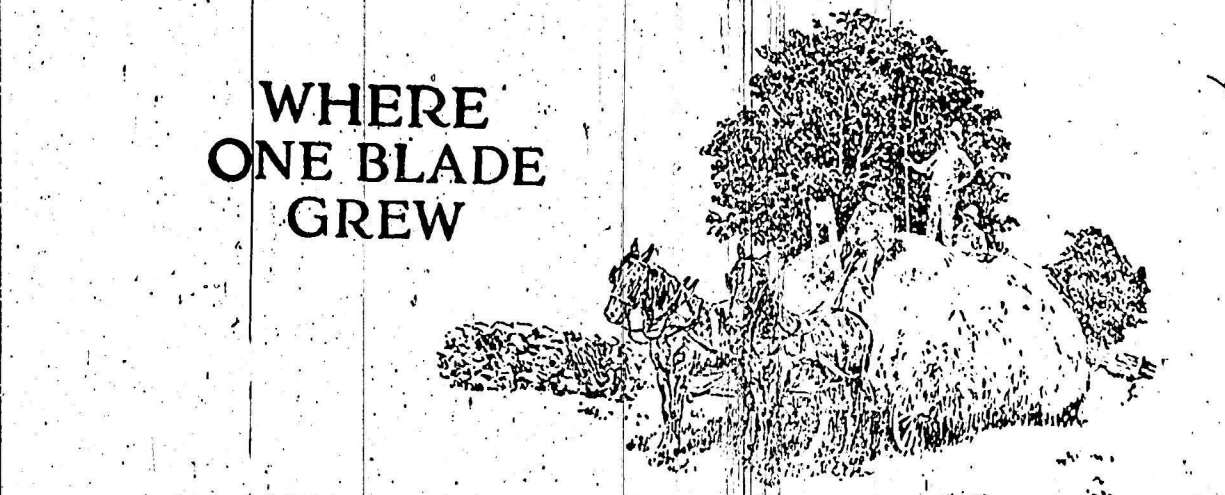
