The unveiling of a beautiful marble memorial tablet to the memory of the late Matthew K. Richardson, ex-M.P. and Mrs. Richardson, took place in the Methodist Church Sunday morning in the presence of a large and deeply interested congregation. Rev. J. H. Oke, the pastor, conducted the impressive ceremony and was assisted in the dedication and unveiling by Dr. E. K. Richardson, of Toronto, and Mr. Geo. Mitchell, of Flesherton. Together with a fine granite monument erected in the public cemetery the tablet was placed in the church by the family of the departed, the surviving members being: Dr. E. K. Richardson, Geo. B. Richardson, Miss Maud Richardson, Mrs. (Dr.) Albert E. Webster, Toronto, and Mrs. Frank Tate, Grand Valley. A daughter, wife of Hon. I. B. Lucas, died over a year and a half ago. The late Mr. and Mrs. Richardson were life-long Methodists and staunch in their allegiance to the Church. Mr. Richardson was one of the founders of the Methodist Church here and was for many years a very acceptable local preacher. 
