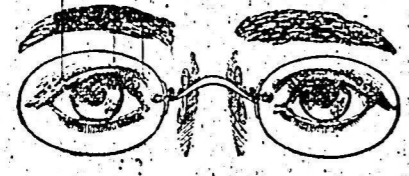

## Markdale's Tax Rate

The tax rate for Markdale has been struck for 1922 and is one mill above that of last year, 45 mills on the dollar. The various departments over which the Council have no control, account for over 35 mills: All rates, excepting for school purposes, are lower than last year. The following comparison may be interesting to our readers:—

It will be seen that the school rates are responsible for more than half the tax rate. We believe that some is being received for even this high percentage, but in the case of High School taxes we believe that they are not justly apportioned. According to law County Councils are obliged to pay maintenance fees for all pupils attending High School outside the school section while the section is obliged to pay the maintenance charges for those within its boundaries. The maintenance charges for pupils within Grey County will average about fifty cents per day and regular pupils will average about 125 cents per year for which the County will pay 50 per cent. The pupils do not reside within the section where they attend school. If, however, the pupil lives in the section, the county cannot be asked to contribute. Besides being privileged to hear this extra burden High School sections are also required to provide buildings up to the standard set by the Department of Education. We believe that all pupils should be put on the same basis and that the County should become responsible for the maintenance fees of all those residing in the County whether within the section or not.

## Who Can Hunt at Eugena?

Several Local Hunters Were Unable to Use Their Guns While Torontonians Were Busy  
(Owen Sound Sun-Times)  
A question has arisen in the minds of a number of local hunters and fishers, as to who can, and who can't hunt and fish in the preserve at Eugena. The whole property along the Falls and for some distance back up the river is a public park, and the game rights are reserved to the Province. At the present time the wild ducks are there to the extent of several thousand. In the Spring the trout abound. Consequently the mouth of every loyal follower of the gun and rod is possessed of a burning desire to avail himself of the sport which the preserve could provide.

Apparently the only ones who can have this desire satisfied are those who have a friend in the Department of Game and Fisheries, or who have a "pull" with some other officials at Queen's Park. Several local sports went down to Eugena last week and had the privilege of parking their guns outside the Park, and rambling through it to watch the wild ducks gambol. Around them there was a persistent banging as numerous shot-guns belonging to the favoured of the officials were discharged at the mallards and teal floating on the surface of the river. These latter gentlemen were all from Toronto, and carried permits. They probably returned to Toronto with game-bags full, while the Owen Sound men came in the other direction with a very large and burning question in their minds—"Why should some, and not others?"

## Knox, Holland, W. M. S.

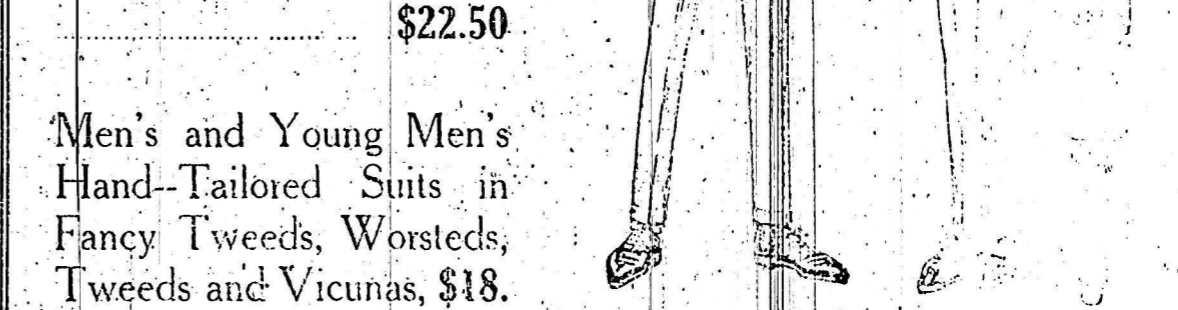
