Messrs. O. Olmstead and D. Strain returned to the Collegiate in Owen Sound last Tuesday.

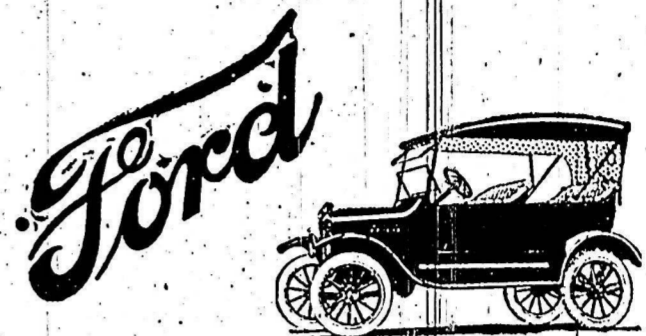

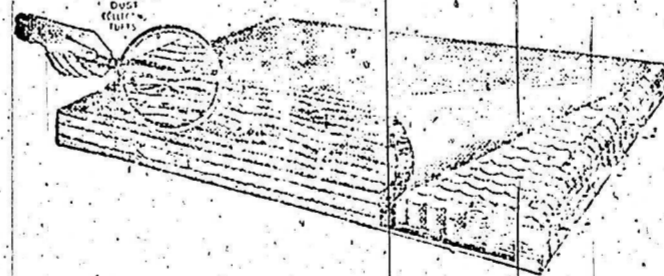
