At these meetings the offerings for all purposes together with a contribution from the Home Helpers Department amounted to \$10.48. In July Mrs. Elliott gave a very interesting study of our work in Formosa, and at the August meeting Mrs. McArthur and Mrs. Murdoch gave an account of the work in Trinidad, the second oldest mission of our church.

Artemesia S. S. Convention

The annual Convention of Artemesia, Markdale and Flesherton Sunday School Association was held at Mount Zion Methodist Church on Thursday, September 21, and though some expected speakers disappointed, there was a profitable and interesting programme. The President, Mr. W. H. Bunt, conducted the devotional exercises and afterwards spoke briefly on the importance of Sunday School work.

Rev. P. W. Fletcher, representative from the Ontario Religious, Educational Council, followed, and in the course of his address contrasted the ways and means of the children with that of development of the spiritual life. As it is important for the secular teachers to know their business before they teach children, so it is equally important for the Sunday School teacher to know his or her business teaching the children the truths of our religion. He therefore strongly advocated a teachers' training class in every school.

At the evening session Mr. Fletcher spoke on the Canadian Girls in training, and the Canadian Standard Efficiency Training Program. He emphasized the importance of the adoption of these programs in the Sunday Schools, for it is universally admitted that no country has such a good program for boys and girls as Canada. Mr. Fletcher's addresses were very able and inspiring.

Rev. Mr. Fowler also spoke in a helpful manner. At a round-table conference many of the delegates discussed the problems of Sunday School work.

BASEBALL

Markdale 14; Dundalk 13.

For the third time this season the Markdale ball players defeated the snappy Dundalk squad when they met in a game at Vandeleur on Thursday afternoon last. The southern boys came prepared to lift the silver-ware, but had to be satisfied with second place.

Markdale went to bat first and got two runs in the opening session, Dundas and Bowler making the complete circuit, Murdoch being left at first. In the second Clare Mercer tallied and Beard was left at first when Tuck went out at third. Bowler and H. Mercer crossed the plate in the third frame, Murdoch being left at third and Clare Mercer at first. They went out in one, two, three order in the fourth. Murdoch counted in the fifth with Sims on second when the side was retired. Beard and Bowler beat the ball to the home plate in the sixth. Sims was left at second in the seventh with no runners. Dundalk fielders blew up in the eighth and six of the locals romped home. Tuck, Dundas, Beard, Bowler, H. Mercer and Murdoch. The ninth was one, two, three and out.

J. Blackwell counted for Dundalk in their first time up and McAlister was left at first. Markdale went to pieces in the second spasm and Armstrong, C. Thompson, M. Thompson, J. Blackwell, Claridge and H. Blackwell succeeded in getting their names in the honor roll. They were blanked in the third, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh sessions. M. Thompson got some in the eighth. Another blow-up on the part of Markdale's fielders in the ninth gave Dundalk five more runs, which was just enough to keep them in second place. Armstrong, Russell, Ridley, M. Thompson and J. Blackwell were allowed to make the full circuit.

While running bases in the second inning C. Thompson, one of Dundalk players, twisted his knee, and had to retire from the game. Carson took his place.

"Murph" Mercer pitched a good steady game for Markdale and finished strong. Catcher Bowler was also in good form. For Dundalk Armstrong was effective in his pitching, but was relieved by H. Blackwell near the finish. The latter failed to deliver the goods and Armstrong was again put in the box.
