Council met September 9th, all members present. The Reeve presided. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. Communications read as follows:—Wards 1 and 2, Commissioner's Appropriation Reports; Special Job Reports from Wards 3 and 4 and the Reeve; F. P. Reilly's account for \$3.70 and Smith Bros' for \$1.00; resignation of J. S. Black as Township Clerk; Applications for appointment as Clerk from Alex. A. Aljoe, Geo. Blainie, Frank Meagher and Hector H. McDonald; claims for sheep killed by dogs from Lorne Livingstone and Thos. Glenecross. Deputation consisting of Messrs. Colin McArthur and John Ellison with petition for road through Lots Nos. 18 and 19, 3rd Con., E.G.R., Glenelg to the 2nd Con., E.G.R., thereby connecting the 10th Con. to the 2nd Con., E.G.R. as an outlet to the Provincial Road.

The following motions were passed:—Brodie—M. Black—that the resignation of J. S. Black be now accepted and that he be granted six months' salary in recognition of his faithful, courteous and capable services as Clerk of this municipality for the past thirty-nine years and also for direction and advice to his successor in office.—Carried.
