The deceased, who is the second daughter of the late John and Christine Lyons of this place, was a teacher in the public school here, and is survived by five sons and three daughters, namely: Jack, Will and Gordon, of Los Angeles, Cal.; Morley and Clifford at home; Mrs. Ted Veigh, Mrs. Norman Kemp and Miss Pearl Chelew at home.

Mrs. Chelew was one of the pioneers of Markdale and will be remembered by a number of the older residents.
