In the individual work, Mr. Lewis Clark's White Leghorn No. 372, proved herself the final leader, and to her goes the first place. This bird's complete total was 294 eggs, and the fact of her not touching the 300 mark caused considerable disappointment to all concerned. The next best bird is Barred Rock No. 175, owned by Neff Bros, Simcoe, Ont. Week after week this bird figured in the forefront and as a result, successfully secured the second place in the year's work. The third position is taken by Barred Rock No. 161, the property of Culp's P. Farm, Berkeley, Ont., with a total of 281; only one egg behind the second bird.

Mrs. Chas. Reed

Susan Reed, one of Markdale's oldest and most highly esteemed residents, died at the family residence on Main Street on Friday, last, following a lengthy and severe illness. She was in her eighty-third year and the wife of Charles Reed, the well-known former servant of the municipality. The deceased had been failing rapidly for some time and three weeks ago developed inflammation of the lungs. Her condition gradually grew worse until a week ago she entered a state of unconsciousness from which she never recovered.

The late Mrs. Reed was beloved by all who knew her and her demise will be mourned by a wide circle of relatives and friends. She was always of a hospitable and friendly nature and ever radiated a spirit of good-will to those with whom she was associated. She was an earnest Christian, being a member of Markdale Methodist Church for many years.

Mrs. Reed was born in Nassagaweya, Halton County, April 14th, 1849, being a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Napper. She was educated there and married Charles Reed on August 3rd, 1857, going with him to reside at Edin Mills, where they raised a large family. From there they moved to the Northwest, taking up farming in the Oxbow district in Saskatchewan, where they remained until about twenty-five years ago, when they made their home in Markdale. Mr. and Mrs. Reed celebrated their sixty-fifth wedding anniversary on August 3rd, the event being largely attended by relatives. Besides her husband, the deceased is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Robert McIlwanna, of Estevan, Sask.; Mrs. Alfred Smith, of Hamilton; and Mrs. Arthur Blair, of Guelph; one adopted daughter, Mrs. Wm. Embury, of Advance, Sask.; and seven sons, William, of Oxford, Ont.; John, at Sarnia, Sask.; Robert, at Kitchener, Ont.; Charles, at Stratford, Ont.; Frank, at Owen Sound, Ont.; Albert, at Alton, Ont.; and Edwin, at Port Hope, Ont.; and one brother, James Napper, of Corvill, Ontario. There are also more than one hundred grandchildren and great grandchildren.

The funeral was held on Monday, November 13th, at the Markdale Public Cemetery. Relatives from many points were present as well as a host of local friends. Many beautiful floral wreaths, sprays and bouquets were provided. A service was held at the residence, conducted by Rev. Mr. Bowes and Rev. Dr. Gray, the latter also conducting the service at the graveside.
