HEALTH EDUCATION

Approximately \$100,000 is paid out annually by the Dominion Government to carry on anti-tuberculosis activities among our cattle, and to reimburse the owners of stock for cattle destroyed. These are the words of Mr. A. B. Coad, President of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis. "In contrast to our association," he continues, "the responsibility in this matter, a substantial proportion should be provided for this work, and a carefully worked out plan of campaign should be approved by a joint committee composed of members of this Association and representatives of the Government. I do not know of any human responsibility that is so persistently passed from one authority to the other as is the case with the unfortunate patient. General hospitals are not anxious for treatment if it can be avoided. Governments do next to nothing to assist the patients unable to provide for themselves, and claim that the care of indigent patients is a direct responsibility of the local municipality in which the patient resides, and has been so since the commencement of time. Municipalities delay their charitable work as long as possible, and often absolve their responsibility when all the ingenuity remains for withholding it are exhausted. In many cases where this tardy assistance is finally secured it is not uncommon to find assignments of personal property, or mortgages demanded which places the unfortunate one under life-long obligations to repay. I am sure you, who have a knowledge of the effect of tuberculosis having visited the average family, will realize the loss of expenditure either or less in a purely commercial way caused by the human type of tuberculosis, the humans affected; or five from the disease, not being quoted in our International Commercial Statistics.

"\$400,000 expended on one-tenth; \$10,000 on the other nine; ten thousand of our people dying each year and a Federal assistance of this insignificant sum prevent it. There must be something seriously wrong. This must be reason. It has occurred to me that it is because the situation has not been placed fully before the proper authorities. Strong representation should be made to the Dominion Government, setting out the necessity


