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Death of Mrs. Coke

It may be of interest to many readers of The Standard to know that Mrs. Fred Coke, formerly Miss Minnie Brewster, of Euphrasia Township, died on November 17th at the home of her sister, Mrs. J. F. McEwen, of San Jose, California.
Mrs. Coke, born Vancouver in poor health, suffering as she believed, from asthma. The beautiful climate here helped her so much that, although she had almost to be carried from the train on arriving here to her sister's residence, 547 Vine St. In three weeks she had recovered so much that she was able to walk to the "Bank Corner" and back, a distance, altogether of over 2 miles. This greatly elated her and she and her family moved into a rented house at 602 South 1st St., but had scarcely settled down in their new home when she became seriously ill. Dr. D. A. Beattie was called in, but on examination pronounced the case hopeless, as she was found to be in a very advanced stage of Bright's disease, which the Dr. in Vancouver had not noticed. She passed away two days later, leaving a bereaved husband and two children, a boy, Harry, 5 years of age, and a girl, Elsie, 3 years of age.
Although so recently in San Jose, there was an unusually large turnout of citizens to the funeral, the funeral chapel of Hocking and Williams, undertakers, being crowded. The Rev. Dr. Klumprik, of the 2nd Presbyterian Church, conducted the service, both at the chapel and at the graveside in Oak Hill cemetery. The beautiful casket was covered with floral tributes from the County Hospital, the Y.M.C.A., the First Presbyterian Church, the Second Presbyterian Church, and from a large number of friends. Her body now rests in one of the most beautiful cemeteries in the United States and the grave will be perfectly cared for as long as Oak Hill cemetery is in existence.
The two motherless children will be well cared for. Mr. R. W. Bräuner is a brother of the deceased.
