MRS. R. J. ANDISON

After May, the beloved wife of Mr. R. J. Andison, merchant tailor, King St. West, passed away at the Oshawa Hospital on Tuesday evening, December 19th, 1922. Death was due to peritonitis. Mrs. Andison went to the hospital just a week previous, where her little babe was born.

Deceased was the daughter of the late Thomas and Mrs. Hutchinson, and was born at Markdale, Ontario. Her girlhood life was mostly spent in Toronto.

Some twelve years ago she came to Oshawa the bride of Mr. Andison and had resided here ever since. Her untimely death was a great shock to her husband and the little family of four children, Evelyn, Jack Frank and their little baby sister, barely a week old. The deepest sympathy of the community goes out to them.

Mrs. Andison was a benediction to her family; she was indeed a mother of superior qualities, true, loving and faithful as a wife. She was a woman, though active in her own home, found some time to render some kindly service to those about her.

She was a member of St. Anne's Methodist Church, and an active member of the Ladies' Aid. She was also Secretary of the Simcoe St. Home and School Club.

She is survived also by her mother, six sisters, Mrs. Shaw, Mrs. Cook, Mrs. and Miss Hutchinson, Toronto; Mrs. Fryman, and Mrs. Boyers, of Markdale; Mrs. H. Freeman, Mark; and one brother, Mr. J. H. Hutchinson, of Exeter.

The funeral service was conducted from the family home on Friday and was in charge of her pastor, Rev. J. B. McLean.
