It was decided to conduct a Standing Field Crop Competition this year, and oats and corn were chosen as the crops. The former selection will be standing field and fresh grain competition if sufficient entries are received. It was also decided to secure Judges from the Department of Agriculture for the Fall Fair this year.
