### R. B. Miller Dead

R. B. Miller, one of the earliest residents of Owen Sound, passed away on Sunday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. F. Gray, 100 Queen Ave., Toronto, after a lengthy illness. He was 87 years old. Not only was the late Mr. Miller one of Owen Sound's earliest residents, but he was also one of the city's most useful and loved citizens during his long period of residence there. He served the municipality in many capacities and always with the best interests of the town and city at heart. Mr. Miller was born in Cooksville, Ontario, in 1836, and in 1855 went to Owen Sound with his parents and became a member of the family. He learned the trade of wagon maker, but later gave that up and started a grocery store. This he continued for some years, when he opened an engine and boiler shop. He was also engaged in real estate work in Owen Sound, and was one of the last of the Owen Sound school teachers there before Owen Sound was incorporated in 1847. He took great pride in the growth of Owen Sound from a backwoods settlement to one of the most flourishing of the smaller cities of Ontario. He was one of those who contributed a great deal to the growth of Owen Sound, both as a private citizen and as a member of the town and county councils for many years.
