## Non-Co-Operation in India Affects Tea Prices

The doctrine of non-co-operation, preached by Gandhi, has had serious results on the tea industry in India—the largest tea producing country in the world. Natives, under Gandhi's leadership, have hindered, blocked and passively opposed British rule and authority, which made it extremely difficult for the Tea Planters to secure an adequate number of Coolies, the tea, and once plucked, the tea is employed every morning possible to shipment. The result is that there is a shortage amounting to approximately \$6,000,000 lbs. in the world's supply of tea, rising, and all indications point to still higher figures in the near future.
