The Shelburne-Dundalk Hockey Team defeated Eberly 4 to 1 in Shelburne on Friday last and won the first round of the semi-finals. The home team was badly handicapped because of the illness of several players, but won with ease.

The special train on Monday night carried a big bunch of supporters to Shelburne when the three-town team won the first game in the round with Guelph Intermediates.

The first period was even going, Craven putting Guelph on the score sheet first and Armstrong doing the needful for Shelburne. Guelph made the locals look bad in the first of the 2nd period, Corrigan netting two in a row. Then Zinn and Mercer lashed for Shelburne and the period ended with the score 3 to 3. The scoring was all Shelburne in the 3rd period, Beard getting two in a row, and Thompson and Farrell one each.

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Daniel Edge Dead

A former well-known resident of Gieneg, Daniel Edge, passed away at his late home in Durham on Sunday. Mr. Edge, who was 70 years of age, was ill a week. He was Treasurer of Gieneg Township for about 20 years, retiring from office a year ago. He was a Vice-President for many years and President for the past two years of the South Grey Agricultural Society. He was an elder of Durham Presbyterian Church for 20 years. Mr. Edge is survived by seven daughters. The funeral took place on Tuesday.

Death of Mrs. P. Campbell

After an illness of only three days, Mrs. Flora Campbell, aged 90 years, died at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. George Henderson, 136 Arrington Avenue, Toronto. Mrs. Campbell's death was due to the infirmities of age. She was the widow of the late Malcolm Campbell, who died in 1918. Mr. and Mrs. Campbell came from Scotland and settled in Gieneg Township. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Henderson and Mrs. Angus McDonald, of Sully, and five sons, John and Donald, of Pittsburg; Neil, of Detroit; Norman, of Dismore, Sask.; and Alex., near the village.

Mrs. Wm. Campbell

One of Holland Township's best known and most highly respected ex-residents passed away in Owen Sound on Saturday, February 10th, 1923. In the person of Mrs. William Campbell, Mr. and Mrs. Campbell lived in Holland Township about 20 miles south of Holland Centre, practically all their lives.

With the exception of three years spent in Owen Sound, Mrs. Campbell lived all her life in the same farm in Holland Centre. She was sixty-four years of age. Her maiden name was Margaret McLean, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Francis McLean. Twenty-five years ago she was married to Mr. William Campbell, who has always been a member of the Methodist Church, first in Holland Centre, and later at Westside Church, Owen Sound. She was a splendid type of Christian woman.

Mrs. Andrew D. Colgan

After having suffered for nearly two months, Mrs. Andrew D. Colgan, of Dundalk, passed away in Owen Sound hospital on Thursday morning, February 8th, 1923. The deceased was in her 38th year and is survived by her husband and five children, father, mother, and four sisters. The funeral took place in Dundalk on Saturday and was very largely attended by friends in country and in the village. Rev. George Kendall, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, conducted the service, in the absence of the Anglican clergyman. The deceased was a sister-in-law of the writer and we have been most closely associated with her in her home life. She was a true and faithful wife, a devoted and sacrificing mother, and one who was always ready to perform any service from which good might result. She was an active and faithful member of St. James' Anglican Church, and at the time of her death was Secretary of the Women's Guild. She was also Secretary of the Dundalk Branch of the Women's Institute. Many floral tributes placed on the casket gave evidence of the high esteem in which she was held in the community. We have lost a sister whose memory will long be cherished in our home.

Non-Co-Operation in India Affects Tea Prices

The doctrine of non-co-operation, preached by Gandhi, has had serious results on the tea industry in India—the largest tea producing country in the world. Natives, under Gandhi's leadership, have hindered, blocked and passively opposed British rule and authority, which made it extremely difficult for the Tea Planters to secure an adequate number of Coolies.

The tea, and once plucked, the Coolies employed every means possible to hinder shipment. The result is that there is a shortage amounting to approximately \$6,000,000 lbs. in the world's supply of tea, rising, and all indications point to still higher figures in the near future.
