The deceased was a native of Devonshire, England, where he married Miss Ellen Shute, of Cornwall, who survives him. In 1871 they came to Canada and settled on the 8th Concession, Ardenesia, where they have since resided, both very highly respected in the community. Besides the widow, who is at present quite ill, three sons and one daughter survive, namely: Charles, of Newmarket; Ernest, of Toronto; and Fred and Mary, at home. The bereft family have the sympathy of the community in their loss. All were home for the funeral.

Mrs. Breen Passing—After only a few days' illness with flu, Mrs. John Breen, a very highly respected old lady, passed away at her late home here on Sunday afternoon, March 4th, 1923, at the ripe age of 88 years. The deceased, whose maiden name was Elizabeth Little, was born in Enniskillen, County Fermanagh, Ireland, from where, when a young woman, she came with the family to Canada, and was one of the pioneer settlers in Ardenesia. In 1858 she was married to Mr. Breen and settled on a farm near Eganville. Later they moved to the Toronto Line, a mile and a quarter from this village, where they lived until retiring here some years ago. Mrs. Breen was a life-long Methodist and a faithful member of the church here, regular in her attendance at the services, when strength permitted. Besides her devoted aged husband she leaves one son, Wesley, at Welland; and three daughters, Mrs. John Wright, of Shelburne; Mrs. H. V. Gaudin, of Toronto; and Mrs. Oscar England, of Orillia, all at the funeral, which took place to the public cemetery on Tuesday afternoon. Service was held at the home, conducted by Rev. J. H. O'Neil, who by his long and exemplary life has been a great blessing to the church here. The deceased's husband, who is survived by the bereaved family, has the sympathy of many friends in the loss of his wife. The funeral was held at the home of the deceased, and the interment was in the public cemetery.

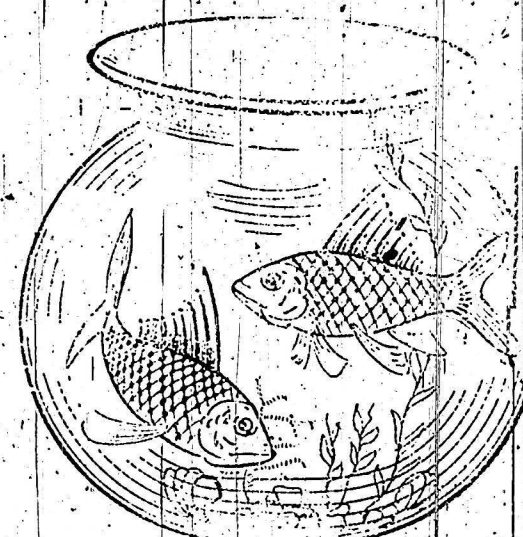
