Our delegate, Mr. Pedlar, submitted the following resolution at the O. E. A. Although it was defeated, it will be of interest to the readers: "Resolved, that in the opinion of this meeting, the supplementary grants of salaries based on assessments should be paid to the Section rather than to the pastor's salary." In discussing the resolution, Mr. Pedlar spoke the following: "Mr. Chairman and Fellow Members: The idea of this resolution has been brought about by annual assessments. There does not seem to be any rule or code to guide the rural people in regard to salaries. It seems to me that they are trying to do the best they can. The teacher last year at their conference said they must have \$1000.00 per annum. As you don't know of any provision as to whether they were to be experienced or inexperienced. Now, is it fair that a teacher with probably \$1000.00 invested, and his experience should make more money than a farmer with ten times that investment and a greater experience?"

To soothe the rural people's feelings, the Legislature promises a grant of forty per cent, based on assessment. Now, what I want to know is: "Who pays the grant? I say we do. Your Inspector will tell you that it is just as cheap to pay the teacher \$1000.00 as it is \$1000.00 of \$100.00. Besides this \$1000.00, they are allowed four weeks for sickness, and five to attend their own occupations, also many other privileges, with \$5.00 per day going on.
