Three passed away to his reward on Sunday, May 20th, 1923, at his late residence on Lot 40, Concession 5, Artemesia, one of the early pioneers of the Township, in the person of Mr. Wm. C. Hanley, aged 69 years and six months. Born in the township of Hope, at the age of 1 year his parents moved from there and settled on Lot 40, which was then all bush. His father commenced clearing the forest to make a home. At the age of fifteen years Mr. Hanley was left with his widowed mother to manage and continue the work started by his father, which he did with marked ability. By hard work and persistent effort he accomplished the task of clearing the land, leaving behind him one of the most beautiful and well-equipped farms in the Township. He was well known and highly respected. He was straightforward in all his dealings and a good son to his widowed mother, a loving and affectionate husband and a devoted father to his children. Mr. Hanley was a man of fine build, strong and healthy up to February 1919, when after rising to carry on the work of the day, he was seized by a paralytic stroke, which completely paralyzed one side. Dr. Guy, of Maxwell, was called, and since then he has been a faithful attendant on him, doing all that faithful aid could do to alleviate his sufferings. For the four-year and three-months Mr. Hanley was bedridden and perfectly helpless, bearing his affliction with fortitude and resignation, he was cared for by his wife, assisted by his only son and wife, and nothing was left undone to make him as comfortable as his condition would permit during his long illness. He was visited from time to time by many relatives and friends, who helped to cheer him in his time of trial. He passed peacefully away on May 20th, leaving to mourn his loss his widow, one son, Charles, and three daughters, viz: Mrs. Amelrose Finlay, of Fort William; Mrs. B. Wilson, of St. Catharines; and Mrs. Walter Akitt, of Artemesia. The funeral took place on

Tuesday, May 22nd, to Salem cemetery and was very largely attended. A long line of motors and other vehicles following the remains to the last resting place. A number of Wreaths, Pillows and Sprays, were sent by relatives and friends as tokens of sympathy for the family and esteem for the deceased. The Rev. Mr. Victor Eard has gone to Owen Sound to take a position.

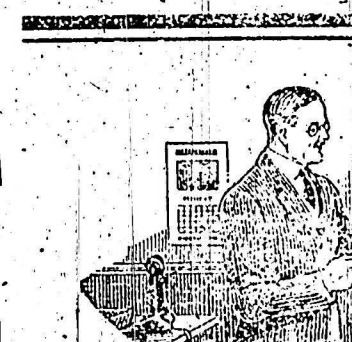

Mr. and Mrs. Avery Hawken, of Flesherton visited with Mr. and Mrs. Richard Park.



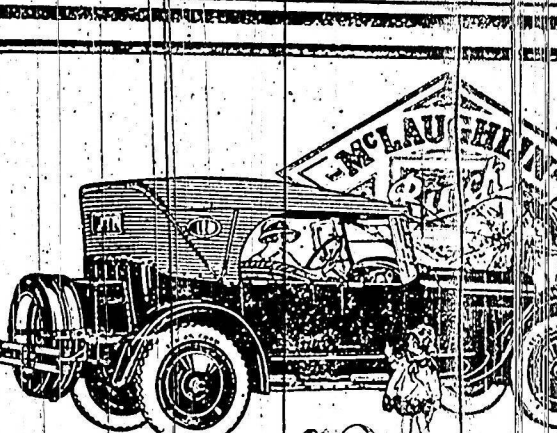
