After a lengthy illness borne with Christian resignation Mrs. Robert Waller, a very highly respected woman, passed away at her late home here on Wednesday, June 20th, aged 70 years, and six months. The deceased, whose maiden name was Sarah Jane Osborn, was born in Darlington township from where only a year old she came with her parents to Artesemea, and lived on the East backline until her marriage to Mr. Waller forty-five years ago.

After marriage she lived for three years in Mono township and then returned to Artesemea, living on the West backline until eight years ago when she and her husband retired here, their son succeeding them on the farm. She was a kind neighbor and a devoted wife and mother, who will be greatly missed by those left behind. Mrs. Waller was a life-long Methodist, for many years a member of the church here. Her father was one of the early local preachers who rendered faithful service. Besides her husband she is survived by one son and two daughters, namely, Mrs. J. A. McFadden, who nursed her mother the past few years; Mrs. Robert McFadden of Mono, and Geo. Waller, on the homestead. There are 10 grandchildren. Mrs. Waller will be the last surviving member of her family. Her brother, Rev. John Oborne, died only three months ago. The funeral took place to the public cemetery on Friday afternoon when an impressive service was held in the Methodist Church. Owing to the illness of the pastor, Rev. F. N. Bowes of Markdale, officiated and gave an appropriate discourse. By request Mrs. C. N. Richardson and Mrs. Blackburn sang "Gathering Home", a favorite hymn of the deceased.
