### 'Twas A Grand Night

Markdale citizens were highly favoured on Monday evening when a number of musicians from Dundalk and Swinton Park visited the village and gave a program which lasted well into the night. The first and chief reason for the gathering was the return from the West to Dundalk of that noted musician, J. T. Park, who had charge of Markdale Citizens' Band for some time, more than 20 years ago. The arrangements for the entertainment were made by T. H. Reburn, W. S. Perkins and the editor of this great family journal, Park, in hands at Swinton and Dundalk away back in the last century. On two former occasions had preparations been made for the affair, but rain had made it necessary to postpone. On Monday evening the weather was ideal. The beautiful lawn at the residence of Mr. T. H. Reburn had been lighted and seated for the occasion and no better place could have been chosen. Mr. Park was accompanied here by several members of Dundalk Citizens' Band, and they, along with the members of Markdale Band, opened the program with several well played marches and selections. In their second appearance on the program, among the selections played was a piccolo solo by Mr. Park, with band accompaniment. An orchestra, composed of Messrs. Geo. and Ed. Haw, of Swinton Park, on violins; Mr. Jas. Russell, of Dundalk, on the piccolo; Mr. Park at the piano and Mr. W. S. Perkins on the cornet, gave a couple of lively selections, Messrs. Geo. and Ed.
