The Twelfth at Flesherston

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'Twas A Grand Night

Markdale citizens were highly favored on Monday evening when a number of musicians from Dundalk and Swinton Park visited the village and gave a program which lasted well into the night. The first and chief reason for the gathering was the return from the West to Dundalk of that noted musician, J. T. Park, who had charge of Markdale Citizens' Band, for some time, more than 20 years ago. The arrangements for the entertainment were made by T. H. Reburn, W. S. Perkins and the editor of this great family journal, all of whom were associated with Mr. Park in bands at Shelburne and Dundalk away back in the last century. On two former occasions had preparations been made for the affair, but rain had made it necessary to postpone. On Monday evening the weather was ideal. The beautiful lawn at the residence of Mr. T. H. Reburn had been lighted and seated for the occasion and no better place could have been chosen. Mr. Park was accompanied here by several members of Dundalk Citizens' band, and they, along with the members of Markdale Band, opened the program with several well played marches and selections. In their second appearance on the program, among the selections played was piccolo solo by Mr. Lodge. Flesherston people had made elaborate preparations for the entertainment of an immense crowd of visitors and they were in no way disappointed. It was the largest crowd the village had ever entertained, and they were to be congratulated on the thoroughness of their arrangements.

Some thirty lodges were in the procession and, after parading the principal streets of the village, the crowd assembled in Memorial Park, where visiting and local speakers were delivered by prominent speakers, among whom was the Hon. L. B. Lucas, of this place.

At the sports field, Fesherston band beat defeated Owen Sound 1-0, while the Owen Sound baseball team defeated Dundalk 1-0. Both players defeated Flesherston in a North Wellington League game by 6 to 4.

Markdale Judge was accompanied by the Citizens' Band and made a good appearance. Berkley, Orange Valley and Vanderveldt lodges were also there in full force, the latter with the Club Cameron Pipe Band supplying music.

Owen Sound Salvation Army Band, Dundalk Citizens' Band and Markdale Citizens' Band were there, and with the many Pipe Bands and Fifes and Drums an abundance of music was provided.

Markdale Lodge was supplied with the Masonic Lodge, was served at the close of the program.

Twas indeed a grand night and Markdale people feel deeply grateful to the visitors for the excellent program provided. Dr. A. Egro, of Dundalk, was without doubt the most pleasing artist on the program and her two solos on the euphonium were received with rounds of applause. The program all the way through displayed good musical talents, and the efforts of those taking part were duly appreciated by the large audience.

Lunch, provided by several ladies of the village, and ice cream, supplied by the Masonic Lodge, was served at the close of the program.

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Dr. A. Egro, of Dundalk, was held in high present, voices their thanks and convey their regards to the visitors for the excellent program provided.

It is hoped that another such affair may be held in Dundalk, when Markdale talent will supply the major part of the program.
