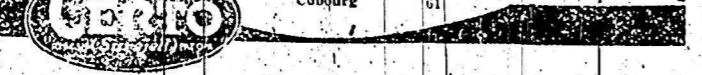

How to Make Peach or Pear Jam

Peel, remove pits for seeds and hottest fire, and stir constantly over fresh well about 3 lbs. fruit. Measure, core and while boiling.
