### Methodist District Meeting

The Methodist Ministers and the Representative Laymen of the Owen Sound District held their Financial District Meeting at the New England Apartment of the Kimberley Circuit on Tuesday, September 18th. The Chairman, Rev. John Locke, of Owen Sound, presided at the morning and afternoon sessions. Mr. R. D. Little, of Owen Sound, acted as Chairman in the evening. The morning session and part of the afternoon were devoted to the transaction of business in regard to the financial and spiritual interests of the district.

At the afternoon session and the evening sessions, Rev. Dr. Long, representing the Department of Social Service and Evangelism, spoke on the subjects of Evangelism and Temperance. Also Rev. Dr. Norman, a Missionary from Japan, gave two very interesting addresses on the progress of Christianity in Japan. At the session in the evening, Rev. R. A. Spencer, of Dundalk, gave an address on the Halleybury fire. Mr. Spencer was Minister at Halleybury at that time. He showed what advantages had come to the Church through this fire, and how Church Union had been accomplished at Halleybury.

The people of New England are to be commended for the royal way in which they entertained their visitors. The ladies provided both dinner and supper in the basement of the church. Music for the evening session was given by the choir, assisted by Mrs. Thompson and Mrs. Veals.

The dominant note of the sessions was a call for a deeper interest in the evangelizing of the people for Christ, on the part of both Minister and Layman.
