The funeral took place Saturday afternoon at Markdale Cemetery and was largely attended by sympathizing friends and neighbors. Rev. F. N. He contracted a severe cold, and about two weeks before his death entered the hospital. Leakage of the heart was the immediate cause of death. The remains were conveyed to Markdale, arriving by the evening train Friday, and the funeral took place on Saturday afternoon from his father's residence to Holland cemetery, where he was laid to rest beside his mother, who passed away some years ago. Rev. Dr. Gray had charge of the services at the house and graveside, and preached very fitting sermons. The pall bearers were: J. H.
