Death of John Hill

Another of the early pioneers of this district, in the person of John Hill, has been taken to his reward. The deceased who was in his 83rd year, had been in failing health most of the past summer but was confined to his bed but a few weeks before his death which occurred at the home of his son, Aca, West Backline, on Tuesday, October 16th, 1923. The funeral took place on Thursday afternoon at Markdale Cemetery and was largely attended by friends and neighbours. Rev. Dr. Gray, Pastor of the Presbyterian Church, was assisted in the services by Rev. A. Richardson, Rector of the Anglican Church. The pallbearers were three sons, Silas, Aca and William; two sons-in-law, H. Piper and Robt. Love, and three grandsons, Roy Piper, Eversed and Delbert Hill.

The late Mr. Hill was born in Devonshire, England, and came to Canada with his parents when eight years old. His father died a week after they landed and the family settled near Toronto. A few years later his mother remarried and they moved to the farm now occupied by Mr. W. H. Hoard. In young manhood the late Mr. Hill married Miss Mary Copeland and together they have shared the joys and hardships of pioneer life. The deceased was successful at farming, and was always progressive. Since retiring from active work they have resided with their son, Aca. The aged widow, three sons and two daughters survive, namely: Silas and Aca, West Backline; William H. on the Toronto Line; Mrs. Harry Piper, Cayton, and Mrs. Robt. Love, Holland.
