School Opening

The new school in the Orange Valley section was officially opened on Friday evening last and is now being made use of for school purposes. The opening exercises were in the form of a concert and box social. Mr. John Boland, of Vandevel, ex-rector of Artemesia, acted as chairman and was in a happy mood. Splendid addresses were delivered by Dr. Huff, Public School Inspector for Centre Grey; Mr. T. H. McKenzie, Reeve of Artemesia, and a former pupil in the school section; and Rev. F. N. Bowes, of this place. Readings were given by Mrs. Ed. Beltrac, Mrs. Frank Davis and Miss Jean Curry. A dialogue was given by Miss Myrtle Freeman and Mr. Russell Freeman. Mr. John Teeter gave a number of lively selections on the violin accompanied by his mother, Mrs. T. Teeter, on the organ, and Mr. John Eagles on the auto harp. A male quartette composed of Messrs H. J. Arndström, S. A. Morrison, W. J. McFadden and Rev. F. N. Bowes, gave a couple of selections.

Sunday School Meeting

A group meeting of the Sunday Schools of Markdale, was held in the Presbyterian church here, November 2nd, under the auspices of the Artemesia, Markdale and Flesherston Sunday School Association. At an executive meeting of the association held in the local Methodist church a couple of months ago it was decided to put special emphasis during the coming year on the departments of boys' work, girls' work and teacher training. These recommendations were brought before a group meeting of the Flesherston Schools a few weeks ago and met with approval and already an inter-denominational teacher training class and Tuxis Square has been organized. At the meeting here on Friday evening the following resolution was unanimously passed. Resolved that this group meeting recommend to the Sunday schools of Markdale that the departments of boys' work, girls' work and teacher training in Markdale district be unified and made inter-denominational if possible and it is further recommended that a meeting of the local leaders of Sunday school work be called at an early date to discuss this matter and if possible bring it into operation.

At the close of the program Mr. J. A. Clarke, the auctioneer, disposed of a number of boxes at good prices, and a happy hour was spent at the lunch. The new building, which replaces the one destroyed by fire about a year ago, is a credit to the section. It is up-to-date in every particular and should serve the community for many years. The walls are of Milton pressed brick and the inside is finished with hardwood and Georgia pine. The workmanship reflects credit on the contractor, Mr. J. R. Dillon. The committee in charge of the building operations was composed of Messrs Ed. Littlejohns, W. J. McFadden and W. H. Hill.

Mr. J. C. McKee, president of the association occupied the chair. Several changes have been recently made in the executive on account of removals, etc. Rev. Vose, of Flesherston, is now Supt. of Teachers' Training. Rev. F. N. Bowes, Supt. of Temperance Department. Dr. Gray and Mrs. Dr. Brown are the local super. of Boys' and Girls' work.

Dundas Won Competition

In the Egg Laying Contest just closed at Ottawa, conducted during the past year, Markdale breeders have made an excellent showing. The first prize in the Ontario contest has been won by a pen of White Leghorns belonging to Geo. S. Dundas of this place with 2297 eggs in their credit. This is an average of 229 eggs for each hen. The first five prizes in this contest were won by White Leghorns as follows:—G. S. Dundas, 2295 eggs; Alex. McLean, Gananouk, 2172 eggs; W. H. Bisher, Ayles, 2165; Experimental Farm, Ottawa, 2165; J. C. Mercer, Markdale, 2164. W. J. Johnston, Meaford, with Barred Rocks, was in 16th place with 1960 eggs; J. C. Mercer won several prizes with individual hens, some of which were: White Wyandotte, 5th place with 268 eggs; White Leghorn, 10th with 256 eggs, and the Winter laying prize with his White Wyandottes.

In the Canadian Contest, Miss Poultry Farm, Berkeley, was in 5th place with Barred Rocks, having a record of 1972 eggs and leading all money breeders in this contest. G. S. Dundas, with White Leghorns, was 12th with 1994 eggs. The Dundas Leghorns lead all Canadian breeders in both contests. Entries for the contests starting November 1st have been made by the local men as follows:—J. C. Mercer a pen of White Leghorns and White Wyandottes in each contest; Culp's Poultry Farm a pen of the Barred Rocks in each contest; and G. S. Dundas a pen of White Leghorns in each class.
