### Flesherton

(Special to The Standard)  
At a special meeting of the Orangeville Presbytery held in Chalmers church here on Thursday afternoon, Nov. 29th, Mr. Joseph Harrower, B. A., a graduate of Knox College, called here, was solemnly ordained and inducted as pastor of the united charge of Flesherton, Eugenia and Proton Station congregations. The large turnout from the congregations interested together with visitors from other churches was evidence of the warmth of welcome to the young minister and his wife. After a brief meeting of Presbytery for the preliminary steps in the settlement public service was held, the interim moderator, Rev. H. Shannon, of McIntyre, presiding. In the course of the service appropriate hymns were sung. The Scripture lesson was read by Rev. A. E. Thornley, of Shelburne, after which fervent prayer was offered by Rev. H. H. Eaton, pastor of the Methodist Church here. Following this a very impressive sermon was delivered by Rev. Thornley speaking from Acts 11: 24. "For he was a good man and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith." Mr. Shannon then narrated the steps taken in the call given after which the young minister elect answered the necessary questions and was then solemnly set apart for the work of the ministry by prayer offered by Rev. Mr. Shannon and laying on of the hands by the Lord's Prayer. Rev. G. Kendall, of Dundalk, delivered the charge to the young minister giving him wise and helpful counsel in a very dignified and effective manner. Rev. G. W. Rose, of Corbeton, addressed the congregation with good admonition bespeaking for their new minister and his wife prayerful, helpful sympathy and support in their labors among them. At the conclusion of the service Mr. and Mrs. Harrower were introduced to the congregation and received a warm and hearty greeting. Refreshments were afterward served in the schoolroom of the church and a very pleasant social time was spent. At a meeting of the Presbytery after the induction service a call from Priceville and Swinton Park congregations was presented and sustained in favor of Rev. G. I. Craw, B. A., of Springville, Peterboro Presbytery. The call, unanimously given was supported by a strong delegation from the congregations interested. It will be presented to Mr. Craw at a meeting of the Peterboro Presbytery on December 5th.

Mr. Thorpe Wright, a pioneer at Flesherton, and a former well known and very highly respected oil resident of Artemesia, died at his home at West Toronto at midnight on Wednesday, November 28th, in his 89th year. Mr. Wright had known but little sickness all his long life and his infirmity at last was but a yielding of nature to the weight of years upon him. The sands of life had run down. During his infirmity he was tenderly cared for by his devoted daughter and a nurse and to the end he maintained the bright and cheery spirit he always possessed. A service was held at the home on Friday evening conducted by Rev. Dr. Hinks and on Saturday morning the remains were brought to Flesherton and taken to the Methodist Church where for many years the deceased worshipped, and where on this occasion many friends were permitted to take a last look at the familiar face. The interment was afterward made in the family plot in the public cemetery, the burial service being conducted by Rev. H. H. Eaton of this place, and Rev. N. Wellwood of Richmond Hill, cousins of the bereft family who accompanied them here. Other mourners at a distance were, Mr. Edwin Wright, St. Louis, and Miss Emma Wright, Toronto, son and daughter of the deceased; Mr. Alfred A. Wright, New York, a brother; Mrs. D. S. Munro, Detroit, niece; Mr. Justice W. B. Wright, Toronto; Mr. P. T. Hill, Toronto; Mrs. Solomon Hill and Mr. W. Hill, Markdale; and Mr. D. T. Wright and daughter, Dundalk. Two sons, Mr. George E. Wright, Kettle Falls, Wash., and Mr. John T. Wright, Independence, Kansas, and a daughter, Sarah, wife of Dr. Earle Strain, Great Falls, Mont., were unable to be present. Many beautiful floral tributes were given from the family and friends also from the Ladies' Aid, Sunday School and Trustee Board of High Park Methodist Church, of which the deceased was a member, and members of the Board were pall-bearers. The late Mr. Wright was born in Lanark County, Ont., in 1835 and in 1850 came with his parents to Artemesia settling on the Toronto line two miles east of this village, where he lived till 1897, when he retired, moved to Weston and later to Toronto carrying on a wholesale wood business. Mr. Wright could relate many interesting incidents of the hardships endured and the pleasures experienced too by the pioneers of Grey County. At 19 years of age he bought the farm adjoining his father's and becoming a land owner until 1920 he never missed voting at a Dominion, Provincial or Municipal election. In politics he was a staunch Liberal, and was a life-long reader of the Globe. In municipal matters Mr. Wright was for many years active in Artemesia which he served in the offices of Councillor and Deputy Reeve. In religion he was a loyal Methodist and a liberal supporter of the cause. He was a member of the building committee for the erection of the first Methodist Church in Flesherton and was the last survivor of that board. For nearly seventy years he was an official of the Methodist Church. But few leave this record. He was a man of abstemious habits, never used tobacco nor liquor and was always a strong temperance advocate. By the late Rev. Joseph Hill, one of the pioneer Methodist ministers of Artemesia, Mr. Wright was married in 1858 to Miss Eliza James, who like himself came from Lanark County, and was a very highly esteemed woman. She died in 1910. Three sons and two daughters survive as already noted. Out of a large family Mr. Wright is survived by three brothers and one sister, namely, Edward and Wesley, San Francisco; Alfred, New York, and Mrs. W. G. Pickell, Winnipeg. A large company of young people assembled at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Fisher, Rock Mills, one evening last week when their daughter, Mrs. D. Woods, recently married, was given a miscellaneous shower. With dancing and music an enjoyable time was spent.
