Plants can now be grown with the aid


of electric light. In the course of experiments recently made in the United States an intensity of electric light, equal to onefourth of the sun's rays, was used, and the growth of both flowers and vegetables was hurried forward by several weeks owing to the continuous light thus obtained.
The plants are permitted to sleep

for an hour after sunset. Then, the electric light is turned on for about five hours, when the lights are lowered, and the plants given another rest previous to sunrise. During dull weather, when there is no sunlight, the electricity can be kept on through out the day, supplying the light and heat necessary to speedy growth. By means of this latest method
