### CHRIST CHURCH

Last Sunday being the Feast of St. Matthias, the service in the evening was devoted to the honor of this Saint. There were special hymns and anthems. Miss M. Dundas and Miss L. Colgan sang very sweetly.

The parts assigned to them concern dealt with the life of the early Christians, and the sacred associations of the Upper Chamber at Jerusalem passing on to the call of Matthias to take up the work of an Apostle of Jesus.

March 5th is the first day of Lent. During Lent, the church calls her children to prayer and self-discipline.

The Lent means self-sacrifice of our motives and placing our living on a higher basis. It means our frequent presence at church services, there to realize how Christ would have us live day by day. We all know perfectly well that we should sometimes stop in the daily grind of house, shop and society to take breath, to push back the humdrum routine of things and people about us, so that we can look into the awful facts of God who gave us life, of the use we are making of that gift, and the death and judgment which await us beyond. Such is the purpose of the Lenten Season.
