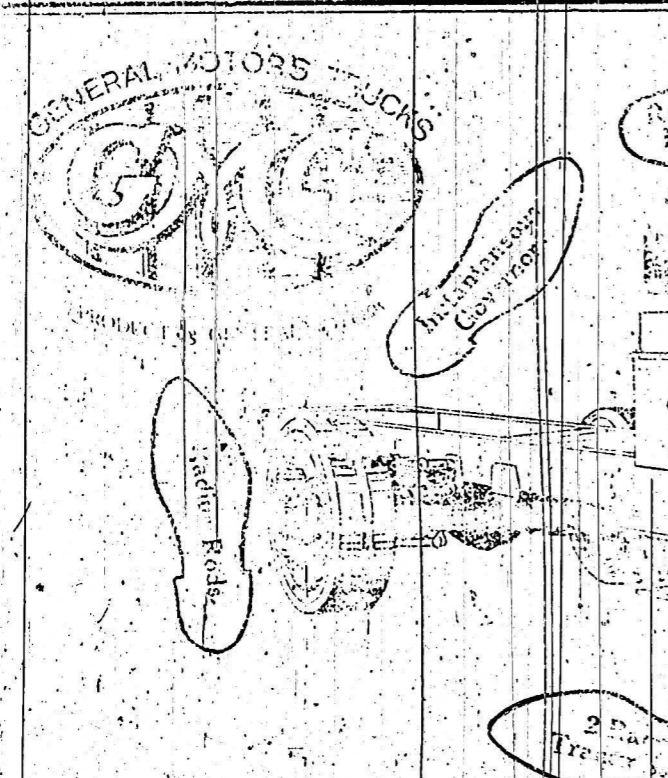
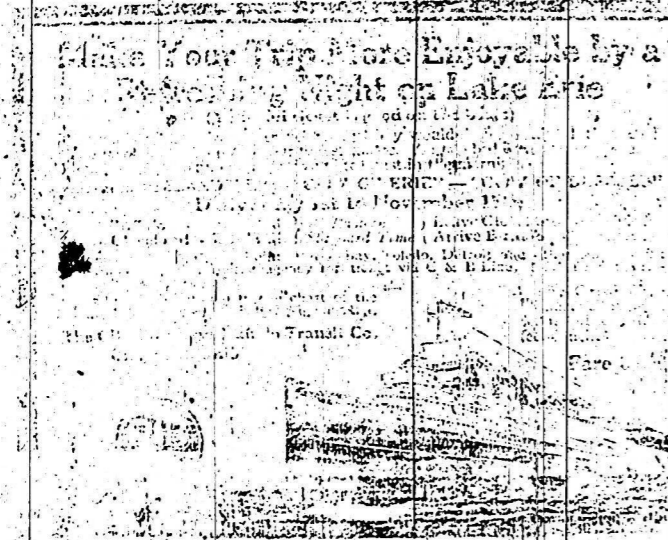

Department of Agriculture

O. A. C. Semi Centennial

During the week of June 9th to 13th celebration of the Semi Centennial of the O. A. C. will be celebrated. Large committees are now engaged in making plans to celebrate the 50th anniversary.

The various committees will be selected from members of the Ontario Department of Agriculture; College Alumni; Canadian Society of Technical Agriculture and the O. A. C. of every graduate, every farmer in the province and every friend of the O. A. C. is sought in making the week a memorable one.

Special provisions are being made for Farmers' Days. It is hoped a large number of Grey County farmers will take advantage of this opportunity to see the College and spend a day studying the problems of Agriculture, which are being investigated there.

How about the farmers organizing a Grey County Motor Party? Details of this will be announced later but it is hoped every farmer will think over this suggestion and write the Department of Agriculture, Markdale, for further information.

Combined Standing Field Crop and Seed Grain Competition.

There has been received at the Department of Agriculture, Markdale, Ontario, from the Secretaries as follows:

(a) Society's entry—Not later than May 1st, except for corn, for which the date is May 15th.

(b) Individual Entries—On or before May 26th. For corn, entries will be received up to June 16th.

(c) Competitors must be paid up members and their names must be on the list of the Ontario Agricultural Society for the current year, and fields entered should be not more than 15 miles from headquarters.

The minimum acreage for grain, clovers and grasses, and the minimum quantity of cleaned seed to be judged in the bins must be as follows: 1. Corn, 5 acres, cleaned seed, 100 bushels; 2. Oats, 5 acres, cleaned seed, 100 bushels; 3. Beans, 5 acres, cleaned seed, 50 bushels; 4. Clover and Timothy, 5 acres, cleaned seed, 50 bushels; 5. Wheat, 5 acres, cleaned seed, 50 bushels.

How about a larger number of Grey County farmers entering this competition? It is an excellent opportunity to develop a special interest in farming which will always be remunerative because of the annual demand for seed.

The management given does not only lie in the development of a market for your surplus grain but the prizes are quite attractive. Why not a greater number enter this competition?

Perhaps you have a son who would look after a field for you. Let him enter and watch the interest and care which he will take of the field.

Grey County Shorthorn Breeders Sale.

At a recent meeting of the Grey County Shorthorn Breeders, it was decided to hold their annual sale early in June.

There will be approximately thirty head of stock for sale.

Field Day for Grey County Junior Farmers and Farm Women.

A letter has recently been received from Toronto intimating that assistance for young ladies desiring advanced working in cooking, canning, etc., could be secured. In order to encourage such it is proposed to hold a Field Day at a date at which various classes of cooking, etc., would be judged after which a real old-fashioned picnic would be held.

At the same time a County Junior Competition would be held. Prizes for all classes would be given and if possible a donation of \$50.00 to be used for a trip to Chicago, International Show would be given to the boy winning the highest number of points and another trip to the young lady winning the greatest number of points in Domestic Science. All participants must be members of the Short Courses.

As this proposition is just in the embryo stage and as no finances are on hand at present preliminary work has to be done. It rests with the young people of Grey County, as to whether this Field Day is an accomplished fact. How about it?

The Ontario Department of Agriculture, through the Live Stock and Agricultural Branches and the Dominion Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, are co-operation in association with the Ontario Bankers to stimulate a greater interest among boys in Swine production and to teach them to raise pigs of the bacon type and earn and save money.

The following are the regulations:

1. Club members must be fourteen years of age and under 20.
2. All pigs entered for competition in car load lots must be fed by a member of the Club for at least three months previous to the date of shipment. Parents or guardians must enter a declaration to this effect and this will be called for at car load competitions.
3. Entries for membership must be made before June 1st. Each Club will select all the sires of which are all one bacon breed. No prizes will be awarded unless they conform to this provision.
4. Club members must enter not less than two nor more than six hogs except in such cases where a Club member may wish to feed the entire litter of any one sow.
5. Hogs should be within the bacon weight—180 to 230 pounds at country points at time of marketing. The special marketing day and Club judging competition will be held during the last week of October.
6. Clubs may compete car lots of hogs through the marketing points at any time when the majority of hogs are the proper weight and finish.
7. Car load entries shall consist of not less than sixty hogs of
