## Vandeleur Community Park

The opening of Vandeleur Community Park on Monday was a successful event.

Monday was a big day at Vandeleur when their New Community Park was officially opened with a program fitting to the occasion.

The first event was a baseball match between Owen Sound and Vandeleur and was won by the visitors by a score of four to two. It was a splendid exhibition of the game and both teams played good ball.

The Sounders are a snappy bunch and the Vabs should feel proud of the showing they made against such an aggregation. A. Buchanan was on the mound and held the visitors scoreless until the end of the sixth. H. Mercer did the twirling for the eighth and ninth innings. Geo. Aiken caught for the home team and his work was almost faultless. The other players were: H. Graham, E. Varling, R. Freeman, H. McGee, S. H. Buchanan and R. Graham. Umpire, G. S. Dundas.

Strathavan and Kimberley played an interesting game of football, the score being two - one in favor of the former. There were many close calls for the goal-tenders, both of whom made some excellent stops. The goals were all scored in the last half of the game. Dr. J. S. Stephenson acted as referee.

In the quills competition Messrs. W. R. Burnett and Geo. McGibbon of Markdale won.

Refreshments and lunches were sold at the booths but the majority of those present brought their own eats and were supplied with tea free of charge.

Dundalk Citizens' Band was present and played a goodly number of pleasing selections during the after-noon and evening and contributed several numbers on the program in the evening. Dundalk has a good band and their music was enjoyed immensely by those present.

The program, given on the school steps, was presided over by Miss Agnes McPhail, M. P., and included short addresses by Mr. T. Stewart Cooper, Agricultural Representative, and Rev. F. N. Bowles of Markdale; readings by Miss Emily Acheson of Proton Station, Mrs. R. Genoa and Howard McGee; Southern Melodies, full of harmony, by Herb Douglass and his boys. These latter selections were vigorously enjoyed by the audience.

It was a couple of years ago that the idea of a Community Park was first talked over among the Vandeleur people and not long after a committee, composed of Messrs. E. Waring, (Chairman), H. T. Graham, (Secretary), S. H. Buchanan, W. Radcliffe and Frank Davis was appointed to go ahead with the undertaking.

The first move was to purchase a piece of land adjoining the school grounds, the funds for which were provided chiefly by the Vandeleur people, although a few others contributed a little towards the enterprise. Since then a great amount of work has been expended on stoning, levelling and otherwise improving, and on Monday the new diamond was used for the first time.

The work has been done mostly by those in the immediate locality and very little has been paid out for that purpose. The whole undertaking reflects great credit on the Vandeleur people and their efforts have brought forth results, which in years to come will be appreciated and enjoyed by those who are to follow. In 1907 a monument to the memory of the pioneers of the district was erected in the school grounds and this, being practically a part of the new Community Park, adds materially to the interest which has been created in the new play grounds. The monument, so far as we can learn, is the only one of the kind yet erected in Canada. There is yet considerable to be done before the Committee can consider that they have completed their work, and no doubt it will be necessary to gather more funds in order to finance the undertaking. Vandeleur has shown commendable enterprise in their undertaking.

The attendance at the gathering on Monday was good, and the Committee are to be congratulated on the success of the opening event. The total receipts were upwards of \$325 and after paying expenses a tidy balance will be left for park purposes.
