O. T. A. Is Retained

The Voters in Rural Ontario Voted Strongly for Continuance

The electors of Ontario decided by their ballots on Thursday last that the Ontario Temperance Act should continue in force in the Province, although the majority is not as large as had been hoped for by some. The larger cities and the border towns were strong in their opposition to the O. T. A. and voted for Government Sale, Toronto leading with nearly 50,000 of a majority. Locally the vote was most gratifying to the workers in favor of the O. T. A., the vote being over four to one in its favor. Woodhouse polling sub-division in Wodhouse was almost unanimous in favor of the O. T. A., the vote being 10 to 1. Below we give the result in Centre Grey by polling sub-divisions:

O. T. A.'S GRATITUDE

Dear Readers of "The Standard"—

The great day is over. The people of Ontario have registered their decision. I am very thankful that the verdict was in my favor; and I am deeply grateful to my friends everywhere, to whose influence and votes the victory is due. To the readers of "The Standard" I would express a special word of thanks. I appealed confidently for your support, and nobly and loyally you responded. You expressed yourselves in no uncertain way. There can be no doubt as to where you stand on the big issue. Throughout the whole constituency of your local paper the majorities in my favor were overwhelming.

But, my friends, while the battle is over and won, the war still goes on. The issue is ever before us; and that issue is essentially between right and wrong, between loyalty and lawlessness. True, one of the charges most persistently made throughout the recent campaign was that there have been many and serious violations of the O. T. A. It was held, therefore, that the O. T. A. should be repealed. That argument was made to work over-time. However, conceding that the charge contained a great deal of truth, the fault was and is certainly not with the O. T. A., but rather with its enforcement. Most assuredly it was not necessary to adopt the desperate and fatal alternative presented in so-called "Government Control". Indeed, that is what the electors of the Province have just now stated by their ballots. And now you and I look to the Premier for the literal carrying out of his promise to strengthen the Act where needed, and give it "active and vigorous enforcement". I need scarcely point out that such enforcement must have the co-operation of all loyal citizens, and that a particular obligation in this connection rests upon every person who, in the recent Plebiscite, voted for the retention of the O.T.A.
