The sad news was received here this week of the passing of a former highly respected old resident in the person of Mrs. Andrew Wickens, who died with pneumonia at Willis, California, on October 13th in her 77th year.

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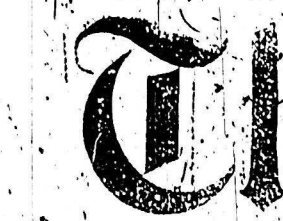
