An outline of the day's work was as follows: Devotional exercises at 7 a.m., then breakfast, Rev. Mr. Fletcher reading the "Bible Tin," as it was called, while still at the table. At 8:30 the Executive met to plan work, and at 9 o'clock the regular session began, consisting of Blute Study by Rev. The President, Miss M. K. Wilson, occupied the chair. After the singing of the hymn "Wonderful words of life," Miss Wilson read and expounded the 24th Psalm. She showed its use in the temple service, the two choirs answering each other in song.
