Dr. F. Woods, Veterinary Inspector of the Health of Animals Branch Ottawa, recently completed the Tuberculin Test on Dr. J. S. Shepherson's herd of high class Jersey cowboys, eight years old, which without a single reactor. This being the third test in a row with only negative results, the herd is now "Fully Accredited" with a certificate to that effect which is the first to be granted in this district. Through such certificate, "Randleigh Farm Jerseys" will be known throughout the Dominion. Dr. Woods states the herd to be in excellent physical condition with all soundings equally conducive to the good health. It is significant to note that of the "Fully Accredited" herds in Grey County, four are Jersey herds and practically all other Jersey herds in the county are under accreditation which is evidence that breeders are making an earnest endeavor to supply a first-class product, viz., milk cream, etc.

Markdale 6—Shelburne 1
In one of the fastest games seen in Markdale rink this year, the local Intermediate team defeated the Shelburne Intermediates by a score of 6 to 1. From the opening of the game at 8:35 until the gong sounded at the close of the third period the Red and White set a whirlwind pace and kept the play in the enemies territory the biggest part of the time, raining shot after shot on the Shelburne goalies, who were kept busy the whole sixty minutes.

About two minutes after play commenced, Beard, the star centre man, scored from a face off near centre ice and started the ball rolling. Three minutes later Beard scored from a mix-up in front of the Shelburne net.

In the second period Mercer opened the scoring shortly after the play started and a few minutes later another counter on a pass from Beard. In this period Shelburne hit the time for their only tally, Ingram scoring on a shot from centre ice.

The third period started off with the players working as hard as ever but beginning to show signs of the grueling pace they were going. In this spasm Murph scored twice, once shortly after play opened, on a pass from Beard, and near the end of the period on a lone play.

The play during the whole game was worth watching, and although Shelburne lost, they went down fighting. Clarke, the goaltender, was really the star man of the team, stopping a perfect shower of shots from all sides. For the Markdale team every man showed up well. The Markdale players were: Goal, L. Perkins that it was the opinion of the meeting that a new pump was necessary and for the council to proceed to have it installed as soon as possible.

Agricultural Societies Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Markdale Agricultural Society, which was held on the 16th inst., was well attended. The list of paid-up members for the ensuing year showed an increase and the financial statement was very satisfactory. In that it also showed a substantial balance despite the increased premium on the large entry of last year, all of which points to Markdale holding its place among the leading Fall Fairs in Grey county. Several prominent members commented briefly on the good and welfare of the Society. All felt that more accommodation for Live Stock is required and it is the intention of the 1925 Board of Management to see well into this need. It was decided to discontinue the Standard Field Crop Competition and put a combined effort into the success of the Fall Fair, which will be held on October 14th and 15th. It is whether this congregation is to follow its mother-church, and on June 10th become a congregation of the United Church of Canada, or whether, on the other hand, this congregation is to succeed from the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and from June 10th onwards undertake to fashion its own destiny. Remember also that cognizance is taken simply of the actual ballots cast, and that a simple majority, one way or the other, determines the decision. Those who are careless and neglect to vote are, in their turn, neglected as factors in the final reckoning.
