The Provincial Winter Fair of Guelph shows a surplus for 1924 Fair of \$2,000.

The Jackson manufactory in Durham, which has been idle for two years, has been bought by W. A. McGowan, who will operate it forthwith as a wood-working factory.

The Osprey Farmers' Milling Co. Limited, at its annual meeting re-elected its directors, Thompson, Sparrow and Ross, and declared a twenty per cent. dividend for 1924.
