Child welfare is a big subject to do with all phases of child life and the general happiness and health of children. It has to do with everything that affects their vitality either directly or indirectly. With the thought long can understand what a little subject child welfare! It goes to the beginning of things and takes into consideration the health of the parents as well as of the children. There is something in heredity. As a child often inherits the looks and physical appearance of the parents, so to do with their health characteristics and their freedom of movement to certain diseases or weaknesses. Child welfare includes all this and more. In fact, can be defined as "everything for the child." It includes every provision for children before and after birth, before during and after birth, and into adolescence and suitable marriage. Child welfare includes the care of children who are destitute, neglected, impotent, abnormal in mind and body, deformed, badly born, deprived of normal relationships and supported. Protection must also be given to normal children. The aim of preventive medicine is to keep children well. This great purpose of preventive medicine, of course, applies to adults as well as children, but it is evident that we are especially directing our thoughts at the present time to those who are in all ways interested in Child Welfare. We have to remove the bad influences which are against perfect growth and development. These influences include the environment and general welfare regards children, but the condition of their physical and their freedom from any conditions.

With The Boy Scouts

What the Scouts Are Doing. The Boy Scout, according to his custom, goes modestly along his way doing good turns helping other people and making a community service in health and skill. And we hear about a thing about the boy scouts if the tellings were left to him.

At the Scouts' Anniversary, June, February 8-14th (during which the big Annual Provincial Scout Conference will be held in Toronto), we like to turn the spot light on these knights in khaki and report their record of efficient kindness, skill and good citizenship.

Records compiled at the Provincial Headquarters office show that more than one hundred awards for efficiency have been granted to Ontario Scouts during the past fourteen years. Building buildings, icy lakes, whitewater, were frequently scenes of these brave rescues—exhibits which firmly tested the skill, presence of mind and courage of these youthful heroes.

Scout service, totalling hundreds of hours is the unvarying record of every

Scout troop. In some of the bigger centres like Toronto, Ottawa and Hamilton, these service records run to many thousands of hours which Scouts have willingly contributed in response to calls from numerous local institutions and organizations.

The use of timber land saved from the ravages of forest fires by Scouts can never be estimated.

Tree planting, conservation of natural resources, preservation of bird life—by building bird houses and nest boxes, and numerous other ways, all winter long, are some other activities of the Scouts.

Serving on school traffic corps, helping the younger children across streets safely, installing radiators for the blind, chopping wood for old people, keeping city hydrants clear of snow and ice, are just a few of the hundreds of other ways these lads have been rendering service.

As to progress in Scouting, records for 1924 show that hundreds of boys have been granted proficiency badges for: firearms, public health, personal health, first aid and pathfinding, and in many hundreds more have qualified in one or more of the 61 other proficiency badge subjects in the Boy Scout curriculum.

Scouting is doing well its wonderful job for the promotion of citizenship and security of our Dominion. May the influence of this stirring movement soon reach the lives of the hundreds of thousands of boys of Scout age who are not yet within its ranks.

Rotary Helps Again.

The Rotary Club of Bismarck, North Dakota turned its famous wheel to help half of Scouting, and so made possible Scouting privileges to the boys of that fine Ontario town. The new Troop Charter is being issued in the name of the Rotary Club; which is the charter member of the new troop consists of a small group representing the best boyhood in the community. With this fine combination—an actively interested Rotary Club, a good bunch of fellows and a first rate Scoutmaster—something big is sure to "happen" at Bismarck.

Canada's Share Under Dawes Plan.

Canada will receive £2,000 sterling per year less annuities payable under the Dawes plan as a result of the agreement signed at the Inter-Allied Economic Conference, which provides for the United States, being paid 2½ per cent. of all payment, it was stated in official circles at Ottawa.

Generally speaking, the belief is expressed that the whole question has been dealt with very satisfactorily, in so far as Canada is concerned. When the matter was investigated personally, by an official of the Dominion Government, in November last, position of Canada did not appear to be at all clear.

In the first place, the amount paid for the benefit of the Empire was very difficult to estimate, on account of the cost of the armies of occupation and the priorities of Belgium and Italy. Furthermore it was not settled whether the amount received by the United Kingdom, under the German Reparations Recovery Act, would be taken into consideration, and payments made to Canada. This also was left for delivery in kind.

Canada receives 4.35 per cent. of all money received on behalf of the British Empire, which is paid under the German Reparations Recovery Act by delivery in kind, or by direct payment of cash from what is known as the Transfer Commission of Berlin.

The date of the first payment of the annuities coming to Canada, and the amount, will not be known until the policy of the Government with respect to the retention and liquidation of private properties is decided, and the amount of the liquidation has been debited against this country.

The Disappearing Tumbler
