**CANDY RECIPES.**

To make seafoam use: Brown sugar, 3 cups; water, 1/4 cup; egg whites, 2; salt, 1/4 tsp.; vanilla, 1 tsp. Cook sugar, water and salt together, stirring until the sugar is dissolved. Continue cooking, without stirring, until the syrup forms a hard ball but not a firm ball in cold water.
