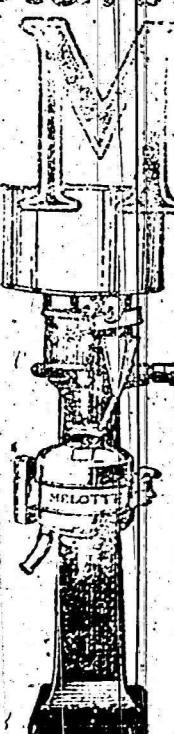

### Eugenia

The Late Geo. Hislop

Another example of fine manhood in the person of Mr. George Martin Hislop answered the last roll call on Thursday, June 18, 1925. He was a young man of 31 years and 4 months. He had been employed with the Bell Telephone Company for some time. On Thursday morning, June 11, the company were working on a line five miles out of Milton. George ascended a 39 foot pole, which broke off at the bottom, allowing him to fall about 20 feet, resulting in a compound fracture of the bone between his knee and ankle. His fellow workmen at once rushed him to Hamilton Hospital, 40 miles distant, where all medical aid could be given him. It was then found necessary to amputate the leg about six inches above the knee. Gas gangrene set in and another amputation was made a few inches above the first. Again the doctors split the leg up in several places to get ahead of the gangrene, but the dreaded ailment attacked the other leg and in the end proved fatal. He suffered much, but remained conscious until the very last. His mother was with him during the few last days. His sisters visited him Wednesday and on Thursday, but arrived only too late to hear his parting words, "Mother," he said, "Will it be hard to die?" "Not if you love Jesus," she replied. He said, "I love Jesus." He asked how he'd place his hands, and as he folded his arms he fell asleep in Jesus. Geo. was of a quiet yet cheerful disposition and had many friends. The remains were brought home on Friday and interred in the family plot in Salem cemetery, 8th Line, on Saturday. Rev. Jos. Harringer, of the church here, preached a very consoling sermon in the church where the remains were taken at 2 o'clock. He took his text from the book of Job, "George's favourite hymn, 'Yield not to Temptation,' was one of the chosen hymns. Geo. was a member of L.O.L. No. 1118, which surrounded the grave and paid their last respects to a worthy brother. The floral tributes were beautiful, there being pillow from the family; circle from the Eugenia friends and neighbors; sheaf from Miss Lyla Johnston, Whitty, Ont.; circle from L.O.L. No. 1118; pillow from his boy, chums of the Bell Telephone company; wreath from the office staff Division of the Construction Department, Toronto; spray from Mrs. Jos. Williams and Mrs. Jake Williams. The flower bearers were his six chums of the Bell company. The pallbearers were members of L.O.L. No. 1118, Messrs. Stanley Campbell, Henry Tudor, Duncan Williams, Will Gordon, Cardwell Graham and Albert Williams. Friends from a distance were Mr. and Mrs. Adam Genoe and Mrs. Jno. Baird of Meaford; Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Campbell, Miss Millie Campbell, Mrs. Jake Williams, Mr. and Mrs. Jos. Williams and son, Jos., of Toronto; also a number of Telephone boys. We extend our profound sympathy to the family in their sad bereavement. Besides his mother, Mrs. Wm. Hislop, he leaves to mourn his loss two sisters, Mrs. John Campbell and Mrs. Wilfred Magee, Eugenia, and one brother, Stewart, in the West.
