Mrs. James Whitteak

The funeral of the late Mrs. James Whitteak, who passed away suddenly on Tuesday of last week, took place on Friday afternoon, July 17th, to Markdale cemetery. Rev. Dr. E. H. Gray conducted the service at the house and grave and the pall-bearers were three sons-in-law, Messrs. Bliss Williams, Will Shann and David Medlock, and Messrs. Jas. Davidson, Alex. Whitteak and Ernest Barnes. The floral tributes were numerous and very beautiful.

The late Mrs. Whitteak, who was 69 years and 8 months old, was a native of woman and as a neighbor there was none better and her sudden passing has saddened many homes in the village. About a month ago she was severely injured when she fell down the stairs at her home but was making good progress toward recovery and was able to be a- bout for a few days previous to her death. The shock caused by the fall had apparently affected the heart and she passed away on the afternoon of July 13, with very little warning.

The deceased, whose maiden name was Mary Ann Gilpin, was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Gilpin of Dunstree and was married to Mr. Whitteak by Rev. Irvine McCarty at Camella on December 22nd, 1855. For some time they resided in Osprey and later at Holland Centre before coming to Markdale about 30 years ago. Besides Mr. Whitteak, the deceased is survived by two sons and six daughters, namely: William in Buffalo and Alvin in Toronto; Mrs. W. J. Little, Buffalo; Mrs. E. B. Williams and Miss Elma in Toronto; Mrs. W. C. Shand, Buffalo; Mrs. Alex. Cox, Winnipeg; and Mrs. N. D. Medlock, Toronto. All were present at the funeral, along with the nine grand children.

Mrs. Elizabeth Moore

The funeral of the late Mrs. Elizabeth Moore, who passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Geo. McKevey in Toronto, took place Tuesday afternoon at Harkaway church cemetery, where the remains were laid to rest beside those of her deceased husband. Rev. F. N. Boves of this place conducted the funeral services.

The late Mrs. Moore, whose maiden name was Elizabeth Lyons, was born in Ireland 97 years ago and came to Canada with her family when but a young girl. After their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Moore farmed in the Harkaway district for a great many years, after which they retired to Markdale, where Mr. Moore passed away about 18 years ago. Since that time Mrs. Moore has lived with her daughter in Toronto. She was bright and active up to the end and her great age had broken her health. She was a devoted and consistent Christian and a successful church worker and a woman who was always a great helper in the community where she lived. Four daughters and two sons survive, namely: Mrs. Geo. McKevey, Toronto; Mrs. Jas. Knox, Philadelphia; Mrs. G. D. Shuldice, Timmins; Mrs. D. D. Murdoch, Vancouver; Archie, South Porcupine, and Geo. N. Timmins, Ont.

Mrs. Geo. Lambert

One of the oldest residents of Holland township, passed away to the great beyond on Monday night in the person of Mrs. Geo. Lambert, following an illness extending since early in February. While she had been failing since that time, she was not taken seriously ill until Friday of last week, and her death came as a result of the infirmities of old age, as she was in her 82nd year. She was known and well throughout the township for her many womanly qualities. Her death will be seriously regretted by a wide circle of friends and acquaintances. Born at Buckinghamshire, England, she came to Canada 77 years ago with the other members of her family, and she was the last surviving member of a large family of children. She was married 45 years ago to Geo. Lambert, of Buckinghamshire, England, and he predeceased her 44 years ago. The family first settled in York county, but moved to Holland township 51 years ago, and has resided there ever since. Deceased was the mother of a family of eight children, of whom six survive, viz: Mrs. Eliza Archer, Rosebush, Mich.; Mrs. J. Farley, Holland township; and Sarah Jane and Edna, William and Elizabeth at home on the farm. The late Mrs. Lambert was an Anglican, and was a faithful attendant at the church services when she was able. The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon to St. Mark's cemetery, Holland Centre.
